






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Women's History Month

Ruth Bader Ginsburg

Ruth Bader Ginsburg became the second female justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. Born in 1933 in Brooklyn, New York. Bader taught at Columbia University, where she became its first female tenured professor. She served as the director of the Women's Right Project in Columbia

Susan B. Anthony

Born on Feb. 15, 1820, in Adams, Massachusetts. Susan was a pioneer crusader for the Woman Suffrage Movement in the United States and, president (1892-1900) of the National American Woman Suffrage Association. Her work helped pave the way for the Nineteenth Amendment (1920) to the Constitution, giving women the right to vote.

Rosa Parks

Born Feb. 4, 1913 in Tuskegee, Alabama. Rosa Parks was recognized for refusing to give up her seat to a white man on a Montgomery, Alabama city bus in 1955, black seamstress Rosa Parks (1913-2005) helped initiate the civil rights movement in the United States. Even though the boycott lasted for over a year over the next century, Rosa Parks became nationally recognized as a symbol of dignity and strength in the struggle to end entrenched racial segregation.

pated in the Hour of Code along with more than a million people across the world to learn how to program computers and that's not a one -time thing we will do it again in the spring. Our students thoroughly enjoyed this assignment.

Our students are working tirelessly to be prepared for our state assessment. Although the assessment has changed from the Aspire to Scantron, we are continuing to teach the standards to our students. Both assessments will be taken in the spring. We are currently practicing with Interim assessments so they will be comfortable when they take the "real" thing. Our Kindergarten through second grades are assessed using DIBELS. Some computer programs that our students apply their skills learned are Stride Academy, No Red Ink, ACT Typing club and the list goes on. We want our students to be ready for the next step in life, High School!

We are constantly working on ways to stay in contact with our parents. We want each of you to know what is going on at PCES. The following ways are used to make contact: Remind, Notify Me, School Messenger, phone calls, text messages, website, letters, and emails. American Heart Month –

Promoting Women's Heart Health!

Women's Heart Health 101 By: Kynthis Jackson

- Know your risk factors: High blood pressure, smoking, high cholesterol, obesity, and lack of regular activity are all things that we can control.
- Know your numbers! One of the best things you can do to protect your heart is to know your blood pressure, cholesterol, BMI, and blood sugar.
- Take action now! Healthy changes in your life can make the worlds of difference for your heart.
- If you are experiencing symptoms of heart attack, don't hesitate to get help! The stakes are too high.
- Almost two-thirds (64%) of women who die suddenly of coronary heart disease have no previous symptoms.4 Even if you have no symptoms, you may still be at risk for heart disease
- Women are more likely to describe chest pain as being sharp and burning in nature and more frequently have pain in the neck, jaw, throat, abdomen, or back
- Heart disease is a killer that strikes more women than men, and is more deadly than all forms of cancer combined. While one in 31 American women dies from breast cancer each year, heart disease claims the lives of one in

three. That's roughly one death each minute. The American Heart Association recommends you start getting your cholesterol checked at age 20, or earlier, if your family has a history of heart disease. And while you're at it, be sure to keep an eye on your blood pressure at your next check-up.

- For younger women, smoking boosts heart disease risks by 20 percent.
- Women wait longer than men to go to an emergency room when having a heart attack and physicians are slower to recognize the presence of heart attacks in women because "characteristic" patterns of chest pain and EKG changes are less frequently present

A Man of Peace



Martin Luther King Jr. is and was known for his peace, civil rights, and peaceful movement. Martin Luther King Jr. was born on January 15, 1929. His father King Sr. was inspired by Protestant leader, Martin Luther. He then decided to change both his and his son's name to Martin Luther King when Martin was 5 years old. Before that his name was Michael.

Martin was a well-known civil rights leader and activist who had a great deal of influence on American Society in the 1950s and 1960s. His strong belief in nonviolent protest helped set the tone of the movement. He was inspired by Mahatma Gandhi because of his peaceful and nonviolent teaching. He won the Nobel Prize for his dynamic leadership of Civil Rights movement and steadfast commitment to achieving racial justice through nonviolent action.

Martin Luther King Jr. was the most important voice of the American Civil Rights Movement which worked for equal rights for all. King was also a Baptist minister. At 6:05 PM on Thursday 4 April 1968 Martin Luther King was shot dead while standing in the balcony outside his second floor room at Lorraine Motel in Memphis Tennessee.
