Elementary Summer Reading K-5

Summer is a wonderful time to enjoy quality time with family and friends. It is also an opportune time to read together and learn new information from books. When parents and guardians read with their children, they build language and new knowledge with their students. Research tells us that when students don't read for two months their skills regress. Reading is a skill which requires practice, just like sports or math facts. Summer reading helps students of all ages keep their skills sharp so they are ready when school begins again in the fall. Reading throughout the summer not only enhances basic reading skills of young students, it creates unique opportunities for learning, exploring, and growing. The Crossroad Academy Charter School Summer Reading Program is designed to promote reading and learning as enjoyable activities. We strongly encourage parents to **read aloud**, including to those children who are already independent readers. In addition to being a wonderful family activity, children increase their listening vocabulary which improves their comprehension. It also allows them to develop interests beyond their reading levels.

K-2 students will be expected to read a minimum of five books from the provided list. Students in grades 3-5 will be expected to read a minimum of three chapter books from the list. Students in grades K-2 will also complete a reading log for four of the books from the list, and the students will also complete a book report for their required reading book





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from their summer reading selections. **Students in grades 3-5 will choose one of the attached projects to do over the summer.** The students will bring the completed project and book to school on the first day in August.

Required Reading (K-2)

The required reading book should be brought to school with scholars on <u>the first</u> <u>day of school.</u> A homework grade will be issued for bringing the book to class. The scholar will be quizzed on the basic knowledge of the book and will receive a **QUIZ** grade on the first day of school. The quiz will be open book. After completing some classwork assignments, the scholar will complete a more comprehensive *TEST* by the tenth day of school.

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Crossroad Academy Summer 2016 Reading Projects Grades 3-5

After reading your book, <u>choose one</u> of the following projects to complete over the summer. Bring your completed project and book to school on <u>the first day of school</u>. A homework grade will be issued for bringing the books to class. The scholar will be quizzed on the basic knowledge of the book and will receive a QUIZ grade on the first day of school. The quiz will be open book. After completing some classwork assignments, the scholar will complete a more comprehensive TEST by the tenth day of school.

- 1. Create a PowerPoint presentation of 5-7slides. Include information and images highlighting the important events and characters in the story. Email your PowerPoint to your teacher when you return to school. See your school's website for teacher's email addresses.
- 2. Build a miniature stage set in a shoebox showing a scene from the book. On the back, write an explanation of the scene.
- 3. Draw a comic strip for your favorite scene from the book you read.
- 4. Design an advertisement poster for your book. Include digital images (clip art, photos and graphics) that will interest your readers in purchasing the book. Be sure to include two paragraphs that tell about the characters and another that gives plot details to interest readers without giving away the ending.
- 5. Make a board game or card game about your book. Include information about characters, setting, and plot.
- 6. Write a letter/email to the author telling what you liked about his/her book.
- 7. Write a letter/email to a friend telling him/her about the book. Make sure you tell your friend why you think he/she would enjoy reading the book.
- 8. Using Publisher, create a brochure to promote your book. Be sure to include the title, author, setting, and characters. On side two, pique the interest of your readers by summarizing your favorite part and why you believe other students would enjoy reading this book.







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- 9. Use a hanger and make a mobile about your book. Add details about the characters, setting, and plot.
- 10. Make a book jacket for your book. Remember to add a book summary on the inside flap.
- 11. Make up a test for your book. Include 5 true/false questions, 5 multiple choice questions, and 2 short response questions. Make sure to add an answer key to the test.
- 12. Make a mini-book about your book. Make sure to include key highlights from the story about your mini-book.
- 13. Write a letter (10 sentence minimum) to the main character of your book. You can ask questions, voice a complaint, protest a situation, and give suggestions or advice to the character.
