NEWS FROM THE NURSE

"Check your child's homework; check your child's hair!"

Just a Reminder that Fall and Winter are prime seasons not only for the flu bug, but for another bug as well; lice. It is important for parents/guardians to be proactive and continue to check their child's head weekly. Treat only if live lice are found. If you find your child does in fact have head lice, please contact your school nurse to discuss treatment options. As always, should you have concerns or questions, please feel free to contact your school nurse. **HEAD LICE FACT SHEET**

What are head lice?

- Head lice are tiny, crawling insects that can live on the scalp
- Lice do NOT have wings and cannot jump or fly, although they can crawl very quickly
- Lice have not been known to survive off the head for longer than 2 days
- Head lice can lay eggs called nits
- Lice prefer to remain in the hair, not the environment

How do head lice spread?

- Head lice spread by close head-to head contact that can allow lice to crawl from one person's head to another
- Lice can also spread by sharing certain items such as: helmets, towels, washcloths, pillows, combs, brushes, hair bows, and hats.

What happens when a person gets head lice?

- The most common sign of head lice is itching especially at the neck and behind the ears. However, with a student's first case of head lice, itching may not develop for 4-6 weeks.
- A person will see tiny, white nits (lice eggs) attached to the hair close to the scalp. The nits look like dandruff flakes or sand, but are not easy to remove.
- Lice look like flat insects about 2-4 mm in length (about the size of a sesame seed), have 6 legs, each leg equipped with a claw, and can be tan or grayish-white in color.
- The presence of nits alone does not indicate an active infestation. The gold standard for diagnosing head lice is finding a live louse on the head

Who can get head lice?

- Anyone can get head lice! Getting head lice has nothing to do with cleanliness or socioeconomic status.
- Head lice infestation is common in the US among children 3-12 years of age; approximately 6-12 million have infestations each year.

How does a person get rid of head lice?

- There are special shampoos that are made to kill lice. Your health care practitioner may prescribe other products. Talk with your doctor or pharmacist about the best treatment for your child
 - All products must be used exactly as the instructions on the label say. An adult should apply the product
- Vacuum rugs, furniture, pillows, mattresses and the seats of the car
- Wash bedding, towels, and clothes you have recently worn in hot water and dry them in the dryer on high heat for at least 20 minutes

- Soak combs, brushes, hair clips in very hot water (at least 130 degrees F) for at least 10 minutes
- Vacuum non-washable items like dolls and stuffed animals or seal them in an airtight bag for 2 weeks to kill any remaining lice
- All household members should be checked for head lice. Anyone showing signs of infestation should also be treated. If head lice and/or nits are found less than ¹/₄ inch from the scalp on a child 2 years old or less, treatment advice should be sought from a health care practitioner.





South Carolina Academic Honors Award

Requirements for a student to receive a South Carolina Academic Honors Award:

- complete twenty-four units of credit as prescribed;
- be eligible for graduation with a state high school diploma;
- receive a minimum grade of "B" for each semester course in grades 9–12 through the seventh semester; and
- achieve either a score of 710 or higher on the SAT verbal, a score of 690 or higher on the SAT mathematics, a score of 30 or higher on the ACT English, or a score of 33 or higher on the ACT mathematics;

- OR –

- complete twenty-four units of credit as prescribed;
- be eligible for graduation with a state high school diploma;
- receive a minimum grade of "B" for each semester course in grades 9–12 through the seventh semester; and
- achieve a combined score of 1400 on the SAT verbal and math sections, or an ACT composite score of 31.

Of the twenty-four units earned, **eighteen units** must be **college preparatory coursework**, four units in additional electives, and two units in one or more of the following: English, science, social studies, or mathematics.



Dear Parent/Guardian:

I wanted to inform you of some changes concerning medication intake, which is our process for accepting prescription medications and over the counter medications. These changes are not meant to inconvenience you, but to protect your child.

All medications, prescription or over-the-counter, can only be accepted by the school nurse. If you are planning to bring medication for your child, please call the school ahead of time to ensure that the nurse will be available. I understand your time is precious, and we do not want you to go to the school to drop off medication and be told that the nurse is not there and to come back another time. By working directly with the nurse regarding medication intake, it will provide us the opportunity to get any other needed information then, instead of the nurse calling you later.

If you are bringing a controlled medication, your school nurse will need to look up the pill on Pill Identifier to ensure it is the correct pill before you and the nurse sign the count sheet. As nurses, it is our responsibility to know what we are giving and that it is the correct medication as labeled.

Lastly, if you are bringing over-the-counter medications, they must be in the original, unopened container with the label intact. The nurse will not be able to accept if the bottle has been previously opened.

Please do not hesitate to contact your school nurse or me should you have any questions or concerns.

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Time to talk

Fifteen minutes may not seem like much. But research shows spending that amount of time each day talking with your teen can keep your lines of communication open. Try these four ways to make the minutes count.

1. Chat with your teenager when he's relaxed and in a good mood. Knock on his door before he goes to bed, or greet him when he comes home from an evening out with friends. Start a conversation about your night and his, rather than asking him a lot of questions.

2. Watch for cues that your teen wants to talk. If he has something on his mind—or just feels like talking—he may linger nearby while you cook or offer to go along to the grocery store with you. Encourage him to open up by casually asking how things are going.

3. Do an activity together. Your high schooler may feel more comfortable

Q: *How can I talk to my teen about opioids?*

A: Explain the dangers, including the serious consequences like addiction and even fatal overdose. When you hear sobering statistics in the news, such as the number of overdoses in your state, share them with your high schooler.



Be a frequent reader

Nearly half of 17-year-olds report reading for fun only once or twice a year. Here are ways to change that trend with your teen.



Keep reading material on hand.

Put books, magazines, and comics in the car and in various rooms around the house. Change up the mix with finds from yard sales and used-book stores. And make regular trips to the library together-seeing all the choices can inspire your teen to pick out books he'll enjoy.

Subscribe to a newspaper. Leave the paper on the kitchen table. As your child gets used to reading at breakfast or after school, he'll develop his own go-to sections. Whether it's the front page, the sports section, or the arts column, reading a daily paper is a great way to develop a reading habit.



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I do if I think my child has tried these drugs?

A: Signs of opioid use include shifts in relationships with family and friends, not caring about one's appearance, changes in sleep habits, and poor concentration. If you suspect or discover your teen is using drugs, contact her pediatrician immediately. $\in^{\mathcal{R}}$

How to increase confidence

Feeling confident can pave the way for your high schooler's future success, both in and out of the classroom. Try these tips to boost her self-esteem.

Stay upbeat. Encourage your teen with positive statements like "I know you'll rock your presentation today!" Also, share what

gives you confidence. "I was a little nervous about my presentation at work, but I felt good because I had backed up my points with solid information."

Give her responsibility. Put your teenager in charge of home projects like replacing a water filter or a printer cartridge. Accomplishing tasks successfully, and seeing family members benefit from her efforts, will boost her confidence.

this last spring, and she said kids tend to make more mistakes and take longer to finish work when they multitask. To show my son the difference, she suggested this. I asked him


to track how long it took him to do homework for a week and the number of errors marked when the work was returned. Then, he tracked the same things for a week of homework without tweeting and texting.
