Helpful Reminders



-There is no supervision prior to 7:30 am. Please DO NOT drop students off prior to 7:30 AM.

School Dress Code

Violation of school dress code has the tendency to become a problem in middle and high schools. Please monitor your child's clothing before s/he leaves school. The dress code is found on pages 18 and 19 of the student handbook. The high school dress code in a nutshell is as follows:

- Headgear should not be worn inside building or classrooms
- Tops should be at least 3 inches wide at the strap, not show mid-drift, not be see-through and not be backless. All tops with a shoulder width less than 3 inches should be covered with a full-length shirt or blouse. Males must wear tops with sleeves.
- No display, glorification, or endorsement of inappropriate wording or symbols is allowed.
- Pants are not be worn below the hips, and holes in clothing above mid-thigh should have cloth underneath.
- Leggings and jeggings must have a top that is no more than 3 inches above the knees.
- All dresses, shorts, and skirts must be no more than 3 inches above the knees.
 - Cleavage needs to be covered.

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 Bedroom shoes and/or pajamas are not to be worn at school.
