

The summer reading assignment for Sophomore Seminar will be Aldous Huxley's timeless classic Brave New World. Written in 1931 and published the following year, Brave New World is a dystopic novel about a world that contains endless distraction but little soul. In it, the author questions the values of 1931 London, using satire and irony to portray a futuristic world in which many of the contemporary trends in British and American society have been taken to extremes. Though he was already a best-selling author, Huxley achieved international acclaim with this now classic novel. Because *Brave New World* is a novel of ideas, the characters and plot are secondary, even simplistic. The novel is best appreciated as an ironic commentary on contemporary values.

The story is set in a London six hundred years in the future. People all around the world are part of a totalitarian state, free from war, hatred, poverty, disease, and pain. They enjoy leisure time, material wealth, and physical pleasures. However, in order to maintain such a smoothly running society, the ten people in charge of the world, the Controllers, eliminate most forms of freedom and twist around many traditionally held human values. Standardization and progress are valued above all else. These Controllers create human beings in factories, using technology to make ninety-six people from the same fertilized egg and to condition them for their future lives. Children are raised together and subjected to mind control through sleep teaching to further condition them. As adults, people are content to fulfill their destinies as part of five social classes, from the intelligent Alphas, who run the factories, to the mentally challenged Epsilons, who do the most menial jobs. All spend their free time indulging in harmless and mindless entertainment and sports activities. When the Savage, a man from the uncontrolled area of the world (an Indian reservation in New Mexico) comes to London, he questions the society and ultimately has to choose between conformity and death. As we read, we question what it means to be human...

- 3. After you read <u>Brave New World</u>, in the "After" column, respond again to each statement. Then, journal in the "After" section to a statement where your belief changed since reading the book. If you have not changed your mind on any statements, journal on a different statement than you did in the "Before" section.

You can respond to: the story, a character, a character's actions, the setting, an event in the plot, the writing style, an idea that the book presents, or ANYTHING you find interesting, don't just choose stuff to put in the boxes, make this an AUTHENTIC response to your reading! Try using the following sentence starters:

- This interested me because...
- I really enjoyed reading about...
- I like how...
