CITING A BOOK

Author's last name, first name. Book Title (italicized). City of publication, state (only include state abbreviation if city is not widely known): Publishing company, year of publication. Medium of publication consulted.

Examples:

* with a single author

Stewart, Gail. The French Revolution. Detroit: Thomson Gale, 2006. Print.

* with two authors

Thomson, Melissa, and Ruth Dean. Women of the Renaissance. Detroit: Thomson Gale, 2005. Print.

* with three or more authors

Stewart, Robert, Clint Twist, and Edward Horton. *Mysteries of History*. Washington, D.C.: National Geographic, 2003. Print.

OR

Stewart, Robert, et.al. Mysteries of History. Washington, D.C.: National Geographic, 2003. Print.

*with an editor only

Bloom, Harold, ed. *Harper Lee's To Kill a Mockingbird*. New York: Chelsea House Publishers, 2007. Print.

CITING A WORK IN AN ANTHOLOGY

Author's last name, first name. Title of article (in quotation marks). Book Title (italicized). Editor's name written as Ed. First name Last name. City of publication, state (only include state abbreviation if city is not widely known): Publishing company, year of publication. Page numbers. Medium of publication consulted.

Examples:

Bureau of Labor Education at the University of Maine. "America Does not have the Best Health Care System in the World." *Health Care*. Ed. Karen Balkin. San Diego: Thomson Gale, 2003. 23-32. Print.

Silver, Hilary, and S.M. Miller. "Redefining Poverty will Help America's Poor." How can the Poor be Helped? Ed. Geoff Griffin. Detroit: Thomson Gale, 2006. 64-70. Print

CITING A MAGAZINE ARTICLE

*weekly or biweekly magazine

Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." Title of magazine (in italics) date (day month year): page numbers. Print.

Lowe, Mira. "The Lowdown on New Credit Card Rules." Jet 22 Feb. 2010: 34. Print.

*monthly or bimonthly magazine

Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." Title of magazine (in italics) date (month year): page numbers. Print.

Carlson, Peter. "J. Edgar Hoover Lectures Martin Luther King." American History April 2010: 18-19. Print.

CITING A NEWSPAPER ARTICLE

Author's last name, first name. "Title of article." Title of newspaper (in italics) day of publication (day month year): page section and/or number. Print.

Lieberman, David. "Google Plans to Test Superfast Internet." USA Today 11 Feb. 2010: B1. Print.

SCHOLARY JOURNAL WITH ISSUE NUMBER

Privitera, Lisa. "Holden's Irony in Salinger's *The Catcher in the Rye.*" *Explicator* 66.4 (2008): 203-206. Print.

Citing Additional Common Sources

CITING A SONG

Musician's last name, first name. Title of song (in quotation marks). Title of Album (in italics). Name of Music Company, year of release. Medium (CD).

Matchbox 20. "How Far We've Come." Exile on Mainstream. Atlantic, 2007. CD.

CITING A TELEVISION OR RADIO BROADCAST

"Title of the episode or segment." Title of the program (in italics). Name of the network (if available).

Call letters, city of the local station (if available), Broadcast date (day month year). Medium of reception (Radio, Television).

"The Phantom of Corleone." Sixty Minutes. CBS. WCBS, New York, 10 Dec. 2006. Television.
