Citing Electronic Sources

Use, in this order, as many of these items as are relevant and useful for clearly identifying the source document. The list is long not so that you will include all of it in every reference, but because Web page content and format vary so widely.

- 1. Author or editor's last name, then first name followed by a period.
- 2. Title of the article in quotation marks followed by a period.
- 3. Web site name, italicized. (underlining is no longer used) followed by a period.
- 4. Edition or version number followed by a period.
- 5. Web site owner or sponsor if available followed by a period.
- 6. Date of publication (DD MM YYYY as in 15 June 2009). If a publication date is not available, use n.d. for "no date." The Publisher or sponsor is followed by a comma.
- 7. The word *Web* and a period to indicate the publication medium.
- 8. The date you accessed the site and a period.
- 9. If required by your teacher or if it's necessary to find the article, include the URL (uniform resource locator—or Web address) of the document <in angle brackets> followed by a period.

(With no author and no date)
