Citations For The Alabama Virtual Library or HHS Databases in MLA Style

General Information

- Always check with your teacher for additional requirements.
- If information is missing, cite what is available and use these abbreviations for the missing information:
 - \circ n.p. no place of publication given
 - \circ n.p. no publisher given
 - \circ n.d. no date of publication given
 - \circ n. pag. no pagination given
- Follow the steps below to create citations for your sources. For further assistance, ask a library staff member.

Before you begin, determine what kind of source you are citing (book; magazine, newspaper, or journal article; reference book entry; or chart)

1. Author's name, if given: Last, First, followed by period

2. Name of article or reference book entry in quotation marks followed by period *OR* title of book italicized. If you are citing a non-reference book, skip to step 5.

3. Name of periodical in italics NOT followed by a period and skip to step 6 *OR* title of reference book in italics, followed by a period.

4. If your book has an editor, put Ed. First name Last name followed by a period

5. If your book is published in a second or subsequent edition, put 2nd ed., 6th ed., Rev. ed., etc., followed by a period

6. Publication information

- Book (city: publisher, copyright date.)
- Newspaper (day Month year: page number(s) such as D1+, A2, 28, etc.)
- Magazine published every week or 2 weeks (day Month year: inclusive page numbers, if given, followed by a period)
- Magazine published every month or 2 months (Month year: inclusive page numbers, if given, followed by a period)
- Scholarly journal (volume number. issue number (year): inclusive page numbers.)

7. Database name in italics followed with a period (examples: Opposing Viewpoints Resource Center, Discovering Collection, Newspaper Source, Academic Search Elite, Literature Resource Center, etc.)

8. The word **Web** followed with a period

9. Date of access (day month year) followed by a period
