## Fences ~ August Wilson ~ Introduction and Epigraph

The Introduction to *Fences* was written by Lloyd Richards, the first director of August Wilson's play in 1983/1985. You'll see, just after the title page, that Wilson dedicated the play to Richards, writing, "for Lloyd Richards, who adds to whatever he touches."

Read Richards's Introduction, and answer the following questions:

- 1. In your own words, explain what audiences value in Wilson's storytelling.
- 2. What do you know so far about Troy Maxson, the main character?
  - a. What did he learn from his father?
  - b. Name one conflict he is faced with as a black American.
- 3. Reread the last sentence of the Introduction. What significance do you think this will have in the play?

The Epigraph of the play was written by Wilson and says this:

When the sins of our fathers visit us We do not have to play host. We can banish them with forgiveness As God, in His Largeness and Laws.

- 4. Where does the phrase "the sins of [the] father" come from? (You may have to do a quick search to answer.)
- 5. Think through this Epigraph, and write what you think it means. If you need guidance, consider these questions:
  - a. What does it mean for children to pay for the sins of their fathers?
  - b. What do you think Wilson is suggesting by writing, "We can banish [the fathers' sins] with forgiveness"?
