# clairvoyant

### conclusive (adj)

## disreputable (adj)

## endemic (adj)

- Native or confined to a particular region or people
- Characteristic of or prevalent in a field

## exemplary (adj)

- Worthy of imitation, commendable
- Serving as a model



Be careful who you choose as a role model; **exemplary** human beings, or those worthy of imitation, are few and far between.

# integrity (n)


- Honesty, high moral standards




# reparation (n)

- (adv) utterly

As a result of his dark, often disturbing, works, people incorrectly assumed that Edgar Allan Poe was **stark**, or utterly, raving mad. His writing simply responded to the **stark**, or harsh, life he lived.

# superficial (adj)



- On or near the surface
- Concerned with or understanding only what is on the surface, shallow

In Monty Python and the Holy Grail, the Black Knight famously yells, "It's only a flesh wound!" after having his arm lopped off by King Arthur. The irony, of course, it that his wound is not **superficial**, or on the surface, at all. In fact, it is quite gruesome.
