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SACS Committee Recommends District Accreditation to SACS Board of Governors for Educational Excellence in the Leeds City Schools System

Superintendent John Moore proudly announced the recommendation of continued accreditation for all Leeds City Schools following the SACS team's April review of the LCS District.

The endorsement was the result of an intensive four-day, on-site study of LCS academics, policies, and procedures by the visiting SACS team. The actual accreditation process spanned an extensive time period of meticulous assessment and analysis of each component of the district's school operations.

Superintendent Moore's action committees, under the direction of principals at each school, ensured timely submissions of necessary documentation throughout the lengthy process.

The SACS report commended LCS with notations that "all core teachers are *Highly Qualified*; the Superintendent and the Board have a strong working relationship; the district has many outside supporters like the Educational

Foundation, PTOs, boosters, etc; and facilities are state-of-the-art and poised for growth."

Moore congratulated everyone involved with LCS by stating, "This affirmative recommendation for district accreditation is the culmination of many years of hard work on your part. I feel both honored and humbled that our district is one that is deserving of this educational mark of excellence."

Moore also expressed personal appreciation with his additional comments: "Thank you, as always, for the caring and hard work you dedicate to our students every day. A special thank you to everyone who served on a committee."

LHS Principal Andrew Briskey added pride and gratitude in his statement that "LCS is a remarkable system where our students grow academically and socially every day under the guidance of an outstanding superintendent, a quality Board, an excellent staff of professionals, and an exceptional community support team."

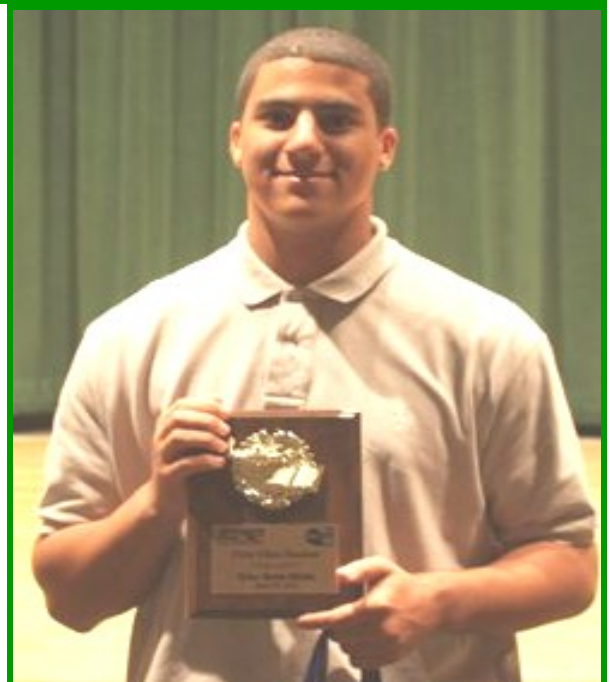

10th Grade—Keaton Glass and Casey Collins

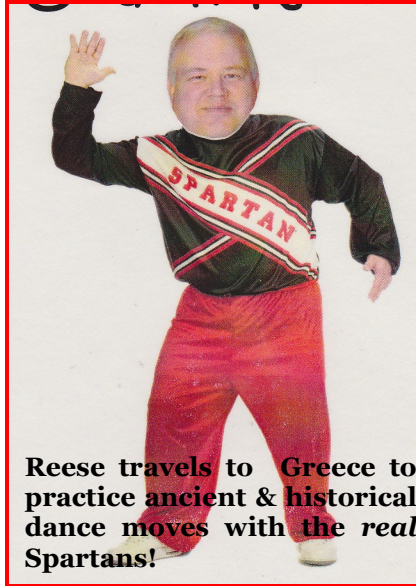

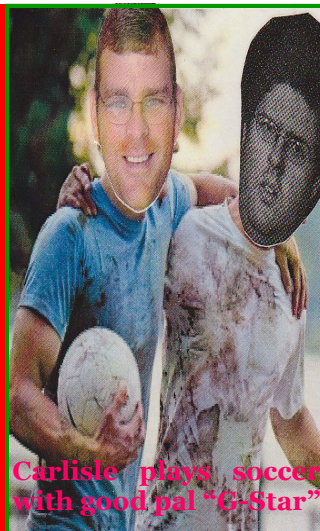
