Course Description:

This course begins the study of the earliest explorations of the American continents, and offers a chronological study of major events, issues, movements, individuals, and diverse groups of people in the United States from a national and an Alabama perspective. Student skills should focus on historical comprehension, analysis, interpretation, research, and decision making. This class requires independent outside reading of course material.

Because this is an Advanced course, you are responsible for reading the text and chapters on your own time prior to class. You will be required to participate in class discussions, answer questions that relate to the material and class activities, complete more in-depth writing assignments (essays, DBQ's) and research projects.

Grading Scale:

30% Quizzes/Homework/Class Activities/Writing:

This category consists of grades based on student's participation, completion of writing assignments, quizzes, in-class assignments and small projects.

60% Tests

This will consist of individual or combined chapter tests and project grades. Pop tests will not be given. Be aware of the make-up policy (school and obtaining class assignments.) 5 make-ups days.

10% Participation (Verbal, Group, and Individual)

Students will also be expected to complete missed assignments on their own time and within the 5 school day time period. It is your responsibility to seek missed work from an absence.
