## ***An Interview of Our New Principal, Mr. Walters***

The date is August 16<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the location is Mr. Walters's office, and the occasion is an interview by Rebecca Mhagama of Mr. Walters, our new principal, for MHS's new news magazine, *The Inferno: Back to School Edition*.

**Rebecca:** "Our first question is an easy one for you, Mr. Walters—why bowties?"

**Walters:** **\*\*chuckles\*\*** "They look better than regular ties, and I've been wearing them since college. My fraternity only wore bowties, and I actually don't remember the last time I wore a regular tie. So, yeah, I've been wearing bowties since college, and they just look better than regular bowties to me."

**Rebecca:** "Okay, now that you've gotten a new position at our school as principal, what's different? Break it down for us: principal vs. vice principal."

**Walters:** "So, being the only assistant principal, I did a lot of jobs. You know, the big ones where discipline, attendance, and facilities—safety plans and stuff like that. Now, being the principal, there's a community aspect to the job that didn't come with being vice principal. I have to go the chamber luncheons, promote what we're doing at the school, not only for parents but to try and receive grants and funding, etc. Even though there's a lot of things that I'm still doing as principal, there's a community aspect that I now have to account for because, before, I was only dealing with the students. And the other biggest piece is that now I'm responsible for the culture of the school. We did Devil's cup and other things, but I'm a big believer in that an organization reflects its leader. You know if I'm sitting behind my desk all day, then what can I expect the teachers to do? If I'm on my phone, then it's going to be hard for me to tell [students] to stay off your phones. So, that culture is now on me, and that's another adjustment I'm having to make as principal. "

Rebecca: “So, you’re talking about being principal and that involving a new community aspect to your job, but how I see it, being vice principal still involves a community aspect—the community of students. Anyways, you started your job here the ‘14-’15 school year. Correct?”

Walters: “Yes, that’s correct.”

Rebecca: “Okay. You’ve been with the senior class all four years. What would you say was your first impression of the senior class? How do you think we’ve grown, and what do you think we can improve on this year?”

Walters: “There’s a lot of strengths in this senior class. It’s like most every other class—you’re going to grow and you’re going to mature and you’re going to get ready to go out in the world whether that may be a job or college or whatever you decide to do. One of the strengths I’ve seen is you guys raising the bar. This class has the highest average ACT scores. There’s a significant number of college ready students, and there’s also a significant number of students who are going to go out next year and make a lot more than I’ll ever make. But, the one thing I would like to see is more of this class as a family, and everybody coming to all events whether it be tennis or band or basketball—any kind of club. I just don’t think that’s happened yet. Part of that’s on us. We need more clubs for y’all to participate in. There’s a huge population of students who come in at 8 and leave at 3. I’d rather have to come out at 6 and ask students to leave rather than come out of the office and nobody be here. So, that’s something we need to work on.”

Rebecca: “And speaking of the culture, when did that idea come up, and what does the school’s culture look like for you?”

Walters: “Well, Coach Wallace brought in the Gold Standard: One Way, and the community really bought into that. The culture part of it is not really about starting a “new” culture at the school but building on the culture we already have. It’s about having that pride in the classroom too.”

Rebecca: “Okay. Random question—what would you say is your favorite class?”

Walters: “I’m a science guy, so I would say science....”

\*\*\* [At this point I cut the rest of Walters’s answer. When I said “class” I was referring to a graduating class, for example, the class of 2018.. Obviously, I didn’t convey myself clearly enough given his response—science. Sooooo, to answer my own question, it’s the class of 2019, duh. And for any underclassmen who would like to argue otherwise—be humble, sit down. Anyways, I digress.] \*\*\*

**Rebecca:** “Any advice for freshman?”

**Walters:** “Obviously, we’re trying to prepare you for the real world. That is going to require you to work hard and be accountable for yourself. You have to do your homework, you have to act right. At MHS it’s about raising expectations.

**Rebecca:** “Last thoughts?”

**Walters:** “There’s a lot of new things happening this year. First off, if you think I’m not serious about the phones, you’re wrong. Also, there’s going to be a lot more involvement of teachers and students. You know, if we’re not growing, we’re dying, and as we grow we’re going to get better.”

**Rebecca:** “Okay. That was a good ending to a good interview. Thank you Mr. Walters.”

**Walters:** “You’re very welcome. I appreciate what you guys are doing.”

# Freshmen Survival Tips: 6 Tips for Your First Year of High School (cont.)

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- **Your GPA is easy to lower but even harder to raise.**

Many students begin high school with high grade point averages ranging in the high 3's to 4.0. There are classes where it'll be weighted, such as Pre-AP Biology or Pre-AP Geometry. But if you let go for even one class period you could easily lower your GPA from a 3.9 to a 3.4 in no time. GPA's only go up a few decimals every year so make sure you start working hard to keep or raise them.

- **Find out about tutoring times.**

Most teachers at Moody High School offer after-school and before-school tutoring. Don't be afraid to ask them about it, because at the end of the day it is a win-win situation for everyone.

- **Use all the resources available to you.**

Now days technology is a prominent part of society, helping us with mundane tasks and making our lives easier. Your computers, tablets, and even your phones are all a part of this. Below there are a few apps that have helped throughout high school, whether to get help at home when no one else is available or make a chat for a team project. What I'm

suggesting is not to utilize technology to "rig the system," but to properly take advantage of the means of communication and research we have available for us at the tips of our fingers and at the touch of a few buttons.




- SAT Prep by Ready4: Get SAT practice questions and in-depth feedback.

- Group Me: Create group chats for team projects or study groups.







# Club Rundowns



**Beta Club** – Beta club is an organization oriented toward community service and academic success. The club participates in Trick-or-Treat the Blue Devils and offers its member several opportunities for community service. There is a one-time \$15 fee and a yearly \$20 fee. You must have an 88% average and no major disciplinary infractions.

**Drama Club** – The Moody High School Spotlight Drama Club is fairly new to the school. This club offers its members the chance to learn the thrill of acting, tech work, stage direction, and more! The club has produced two shows so far, the most recent being Peter Pan last spring. Auditions for their upcoming production of The Wizard of Oz will be held in October. There is no membership fee or academic requirement to join.

**Scholars' Bowl** – Scholars' Bowl is a club that attends the district level scholastic competition. The competition includes trivia from several different categories such as: geography, math, history, and pop culture. The club meets on Mondays from 3:00-4:00pm. There are no fees or requirements to join.

**Key Club** – Key club is another opportunity for students to serve their community. The club participates in Trick-or-Treat the Blue Devils and the Pancake Supper at Carpenetti's. There is a \$30 membership fee, which includes a tee shirt. Underclassmen must complete 20 hours of service and seniors must complete 40 hours. There are no academic requirements to join.

**FBLA** – Future Business Leaders of America; FBLA is an organization designed to help prepare its members for success in several fields of business such as: designing products, keeping inventory, advertising, and more. This year, members will implement these skills by opening and managing a school store. There is a \$15 club fee and no academic requirements to join.

**Art Club** – Art club offers the aspiring young artists of Moody High a chance to use their creativity to benefit the school! The club hosts several art shows and participates in community events such as Trick-or-Treat the Blue Devils and Pinwheels for Peace, which will be Sept. 21st this year. The club meets every other Wednesday, with the next meeting being September 5th. There is a \$12 club fee, which covers the price of a t-shirt and club members must donate candy for Trick-or-Treat the Blue Devils and for the Homecoming float.

**FCCLA** – Family Career and Community Leaders of America; The goal of FCCLA is to improve the lives of individuals and families in the community. The club participates in Hope Lodge and Trick-or-Treat the Blue Devils. There is a \$25 club fee and you must have taken or currently be enrolled in a Family Consumer Science class. The deadline to join is September 14th.

**FFA** – Future Farmers of America; FFA is a group that teaches discipline and hard work to those interested in careers in agriculture. The organization has built a greenhouse, maintained a farm with livestock, and sold farm-fresh eggs. They have much more to come and would love your help! You must be in an Agricultural class to join and there is a \$20 membership fee. Once joined, you must write an essay describing a supervised agricultural project and you must complete 31 hours of community service.

**FCA** – Fellowship of Christian Athletes; FCA is an organization dedicated to inspiring athletes through fellowship and Bible study. The club meets every Tuesday at 7:30. You do not have to be an athlete to attend. There are no requirements to join.

**First Priority** – First Priority offers Christian students an opportunity to fellowship together, dig into God's words, and offers a way for different churches to unite through the youth. The mission statement for the organization is "Reaching our campus for Christ". There are no requirements to join.


