The purpose of the summer reading and writing assignment is to prepare you for the demanding nature of the class, while also exposing you to a variety of writing styles, modes, and purposes. While this class is considered a college level course and will be challenging, you should enjoy the content. The ultimate goal of the AP English Language and Composition class is to teach you the art of reading, writing, and critical thinking; it is NOT intended to help you maintain a perfect grade point average. The AP Exam is also quite important; you will be prepared accordingly for it.

Students and parents should be aware that failing to complete the summer reading is not a reason to request a schedule change; additionally, students who do not complete the summer assignments will begin the semester with several zeroes, which can cause a significant decrease in the semester grade. Students can overcome zeroes associated with summer reading, but doing so will require diligence and excellence in completing all other work.

#### YOUR TASKS

#### Task #1: Read the Book

This seems silly, but it is necessary to read the book. You will be expected to participate in class discussion, write essays, and complete assignments that require knowledge of texts. You don't have to purchase them, but I do recommend having your own copy of each novel. This way, you can annotate freely.

#### Task #2: Dialectical Journals

Create a dialectical journal for your novel.
