TEN WAYS PARENTS CAN HELP THEIR (HILDREN DECIDE ON A CAREER

- Encourage your teen to investigate a variety of careers. At the dinner table, talk about work and your job. Talk with friends and relatives about their jobs when your children are present.
- 2. Stress to your teen that school is his or her work. You don't take a day off from work just because you feel like it. The same goes for school.
- 3. Explore their talents, strengths, likes, and dislikes without being judgmental. The more teens know about themselves the easier it is for them to recognize the career that best suits them.
- 4. Talk to your school counselors about career and technical education programs.
- 5. Provide as many opportunities as you can for your child to learn technical skills. Give him/her a chance to experience hands-on tools, techniques, and skills that can be applied to a broad range of careers.
- 6. Support your school's efforts to expose students to various career possibilities. Work through your site counsel or ask teachers and administration to offer job fairs, field trips, and class speakers.
- 7. Talk about a career as a goal of education.
- 8. Guide your teen toward acquiring skills. Encourage him/her to take courses that provide the opportunity to apply skills.
- 9. Give your teen responsibility. Begin with jobs around the house.
- 10. Suggest that your teen explore career opportunities that were once considered only for males or females. Non-traditional jobs provide excellent opportunities.
