Ms. Anne's 3rd-5th Grade Class

Lower Elementary



Greetings,

A common saying among Montessori teachers is "We can do hard things!"

Often this comes as a response to a child who complains that a proposed project or task will be "too hard" before they've even tried it.

In preparation for Hoedown, Upper Elementary did a hard thing: we wrote with fire! Students used a wood burning tool to draw designs on circles of wood. It was hard. We did the math, and it took each student who participated an average of 28 minutes just to burn their piece.

But guess what? As we did this work, the classroom reached a new level of calm concentration. What's more, students quietly complimented and encouraged the craftsperson the whole time it was happening.

Later, I came across the following passage from Madeline L'Engle's *A Wrinkle in Time*, examining the dynamics between parents and a (preternaturally self-aware) child who's been asked to do hard things:

At last she turned to her father. "I'm--I'm sorry, Father."

He took both her hands in his, bent down to her with his short-sighted eyes. "Sorry for what, Megatron?" Tears almost came to her eyes at the gentle use of the old nickname. "I wanted you to do it all for me. I wanted everything to be all easy and simple...So I tried to pretend that it was all your fault...because I was scared, and I didn't want to have to do anything myself--"

"But I wanted to do it for you," Mr. Murry said. "That's what every parent wants." He looked into her dark, frightened eyes. "I won't let you go, Meg. I am going."

"No." Mrs. Whatsit's voice was sterner than Meg had ever heard it. "You are going to allow Meg the privilege of accepting this danger. You are a wise man, Mr. Murry. You are going to let her go."

Mr. Murry sighed. He drew Meg close to him. "Little Megaparsec. Don't be afraid to be afraid. We will try to have courage for you. That is all we can do. Your mother--"

"Mother was always shoving me out into the world," Meg said. "She'd want me to do this. You know she would. Tell her-" she started, choked, then held up her head and said, "No. Never mind. I'll tell her myself."

"Good girl. Of course you will."

This week, if your child complains that something is too hard, or *especially* if they predict that something they haven't yet tried *will* be too hard, try to refrain from either voicing sympathy or offering some unrelated treat or reward. Say, instead, "Well, we can do hard things."

If you can, remind them of an intrinsic skill-based reward that comes with the task, as in: "Just think how well you'll be able to read/write/spell/solve problems after you've done all that!"

If you must offer a reward, frame the result of the work as the trophy, as in: "When you're done, you'll have a book that you wrote all by yourself!" or "When you're done, you'll have the answer!"

As adults, we know that just because something's hard, doesn't mean it's *too* hard (for example: parenting or teaching). Let's help the children of our community learn and remember this lesson.

Dear Families,

What a day we had a Whiskeytown Lake Tuesday! Our Whiskeytown Environmental Camp Naturalist, Lori, led the students to discover many aspects of fire ecology, fire recovery, and questions scientists are still researching and debating about fire-affected lands. She told us how Lodge pole pine cones will only open when heated: serotinous. We also saw quartz outside a former gold mine, because gold and quartz vein together due to hydrothermal activity.

In addition, we reviewed our lessons on the sun, moon, and Earth for Friday's test. Your student should be able to tell you the moon cycle, and why we have seasons. One reading group is deep into *Wrinkle in Time;* another reading group is wrapping up *Raisin in the Sun*, to be followed by a writing project about overcoming obstacles. In history, we're studying ancient Rome.

Starting in Kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.

Missing 10% (18 days) can make it harder to learn key skills, like reading.

Absences can affect the whole classroom.

Don't let your child stay home unless he/she is truly sick. Keep in mind that complaints of tummy aches may be a sign of anxiety; talk to your child's teacher or counselor.

Avoid extended trips when school is in session; consult the school calendar to see when breaks occur.

Set up a regular bedtime as well as morning and evening routines.

Become a Problem?

Chronic absence: Two or more days per month (excused and unexcused)

Warning Signs: One-two days per month or more than three days in a row.

Satisfactory: One or fewer absences per month.







New CDE Mobile App Helps Families Find Summer and Afterschool Meal Program Locations

THE CDE'S CA MEALS FOR KIDS HAS JUST RELEASED A MOBILE APP THAT ALLOWS USERS TO FIND THE CALIFORNIA'S SUMMER AND AFTERSCHOOL MEAL PROGRAMS SITES IN THEIR COMMUNITIES. THESE PROGRAMS PROVIDE NO-COST MEALS TO CHILDREN AGED EIGHTEEN AND UNDER. FAMILIES, COMMUNITY MEMBERS, AND SCHOOL PERSONNEL CAN USE LOCATION-BASED SEARCHES TO FIND MEAL SITES, DATES, AND TIMES. THE APP ALSO ALLOWS FOR SEARCHES BY SITE NAME, ZIP CODE, AND CITY.

ATTENDANCE in the early grades

Many of our youngest students miss 10 percent of the school year—about 18 days a year or just two days every month. Chronic absenteeism in kindergarten, and even preK, can predict lower test scores, poor attendance and retention in later grades, especially if the problem persists for more than a year. Do you know how many young children are chronically absent in your school or community?



Who Is Affected

Kindergarten and 1st grade classes often have absenteeism rates as high as those in high school. Many of these absences are excused, but they still add up to lost time in the classroom.

Why It Matters

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.

Preliminary data from a California study found that children who were chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade were far less likely to read proficiently at the end of 3rd grade.

What We Can Do



Engage Families

Many parents and students don't realize how quickly early absences can add up to academic trouble. Community members and teachers can educate families and build a culture of attendance through early outreach, incentives and attention to data.



Fix Transportation

The lack of a reliable car, or simply missing the school bus, can mean some students don't make it to class. Schools, transit agencies and community partners can organize car pools, supply bus passes or find other ways to get kids to school.



Address Health Needs

Health concerns, particularly asthma and dental problems, are among the leading reasons students miss school in the early grades. Schools and medical professionals can work together to give children and families health care and advice.



Track the Right Data

Schools too often overlook chronic absence because they track average attendance or unexcused absences, not how many kids miss too many days for any reason. Attendance Works has free data-tracking tools.

These are a few steps that communities and schools can take. How do you think you can help?
