We've been exploring ways to repurpose and recycle materials to create new things. This week our "save it" box has been purged of cartons, cardboard, bits and pieces to create robots!








Keep reading...see page two!

Without rain, there would be no rainbows. Since returning from winter break we've had quite a bit of rain; 1.7 inches to be exact, according to our Oak Seed Preschool rain gauge . Even though we have not observed any rainbows this month, we have learned that a rainbow has 7 colors: red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and purple. We are practicing putting objects into "rainbow order" beginning with red. Red is always the top layer of the rainbow because it has the longest wavelength of light. Each color is progressively shorter, ending with purple, the shortest wavelength. We are experimenting with these colors by observing how salt absorbs colored paints.





When the sun shines, children are practicing climbing and balancing skills outdoors.



Letters to a Pre-Scientist started with 1 teacher in rural NC in 2010, who teamed up with a PhD scientist to create a network of penpals for her underperforming students. Gradually, more teachers were added.

In 2016, with a team of 7 teachers, LPS began collecting impact data and found 71% of the students agree that having a pen pal helped them learn new science.

In 2019, LPS was granted their nonprofit status and held its first all-expense paid training for teachers in Los Angeles: 25 teachers from 6 states with over 1700 students and a bank of 2,000+ scientists! Currently, there are only 2 teachers north of Sacramento using LPS (1 in Burney).

As a first year teacher, I really appreciate the training and support the program has offered, with 2 fulltime employees. LPS uses SLACK to communicate, AIRTABLE to organize all our data, and a shared drive with free curriculum for each letter round. I keep these pinned to my laptop for quick access. I learned to use them at the training. I am fortunate that I have my students all day and can have them work on letters during English as well as Science, if needed, but many other LPS teachers successfully implement the program even when they have 150 students per day!

Students take a survey which matches them with a scientist who either does a type of science they like, or has similar interests outside of science, such as sports or cooking. With only 14 students, we've got pen pals in multiple states, Germany, and India!

The amount of time needed varies, but many teachers spend about a week (1 hr/day) on each round, with 4 letter rounds per year, and a little extra time to set up at the beginning. Some teachers have students write the rough draft as homework to reduce class time. The students are very excited to get their letters and even look up their scientist's work or college online. Each round has a theme; for instance, round 2 is about the education their scientist needed to get their position.

The students' last names are not used, and letters only come through the school. Students may opt out of social media photos, but may NOT opt out of the program. If a student has special needs, audio files can be sent by or to the student, to go along with the letter. Scientists get support for using student-friendly language, and include photos or drawings.

Sometimes videoconferences are arranged, such as the one we had with 1 scientist, Alex in Washington DC, who helps brain-map for people who have had traumatic injuries and might benefit from the use of robotics controlled by thought, or need specialized brain surgery. Alex sent us educational pamphlets, stickers, pens, and foam brains from a brain conference he attended.

One student received a sticker of the insect his scientist studies, while another received a butterfly book from her pen pal. The pen pal of one of my students told him about a website where that student learned to program a game which was then used (with his permission) on an app! He would not have known about this if not for his scientist.

I plan for my students to create a trifold about their pen pal and his/her area of science to present to the younger students at our school, but that's an extension idea, not a requirement.

# ATTENTION 4th GRADE PARENTS





### Rules and instructions

#### Official rules

- The pass is for U.S. fourth-grade (or home-school equivalent) students.
- The pass is for the 2019 to 2020 school year. It expires August 31, 2020.
- · Students can't transfer the pass to anyone else.
- We can't accept electronic versions of this paper for access or to exchange for a pass.
- · No refunds are given for previously purchased passes, or if you forget your pass when you visit.
- . If you lose your pass, get a new one by visiting the website and signing up again.
- · Educators can get one paper pass for each of their fourth-grade students.
- · This program only provides passes for fourth graders.

### How it works

- · Show your pass to a ranger when you enter. If there is no ranger, leave it on the dashboard of your car.
- If you visit a site that charges entrance fees per person— The pass admits all children under 16 and up to three adults for free.
- If your group visits a site that charges vehicle entrance fees The pass admits all children under 16 and all adults in up to one passenger vehicle. Commercial vehicles can't use a pass to get in.
- If you arrive at a site on bicycle—The pass admits all children under 16 and up to three adults on bicycles.
- The pass doesn't cover things like parking fees, camping, boats, and special tours. Also, some sites are
  managed by private operators. They may not honor the pass. Check with the site ahead of time to find
  out
- The pass doesn't cover fees for local, city, or state parks and recreation areas unless they say that they
  accept this pass.
- · Paper passes can be exchanged for plastic passes at certain sites.

Did you know that fourth graders, who participate in the Every Kid Outdoors program, are eligible for a free Christmas tree permit? The Every Kid Outdoors program introduces 4th graders to the public lands in their own backyards and beyond. To receive a free Christmas tree permit, 4th graders with the help of their parents, need to visit the website <a href="www.everykidoutdoors.gov">www.everykidoutdoors.gov</a> and follow the steps to obtain their pass. Once complete, they can download and print their pass.

Teachers may also visit the website and download lesson plans to complete with their 4th grade students and print passes for them. Fourth graders must then accompany a parent to any Shasta-Trinity National Forest office in order to receive their free Christmas Tree permit.

Permits may be purchased through mail or by going to the Shasta-Trinity National Forest Headquarters off of Avtech Parkway, Shasta Lake Ranger Station in Mountain Gate, Mt. Shasta Ranger Station, McCloud Ranger Station Weaverville Ranger Station, Harrison Gulch Ranger Station, and Hayfork Ranger Station.

# ATTEND TO ACHIEVE ABSENCES ADD UP



### Did You Know?

Starting in Kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.

Missing 10% (18 days) can make it harder to learn key skills, like reading.

Absences can affect the whole classroom.



### What You Can Do

Don't let your child stay home unless he/she is truly sick. Keep in mind that complaints of tummy aches may be a sign of anxiety; talk to your child's teacher or counselor.

Avoid extended trips when school is in session; consult the school calendar to see when breaks occur.

Set up a regular bedtime as well as morning and evening routines.



### When Do Absences Become a Problem?


Chronic absence: Two or more days per month (excused and unexcused)

Warning Signs: One-two days per month or more than three days in a row.

Satisfactory: One or fewer absences per month.







New CDE Mobile App Helps Families Find Summer and Afterschool Meal Program Locations

THE CDE'S CA MEALS FOR KIDS HAS JUST RELEASED A MOBILE APP THAT ALLOWS USERS TO FIND THE CALIFORNIA'S SUMMER AND AFTERSCHOOL MEAL PROGRAMS SITES IN THEIR COMMUNITIES. THESE PROGRAMS PROVIDE NO-COST MEALS TO CHILDREN AGED EIGHTEEN AND UNDER. FAMILIES, COMMUNITY MEMBERS, AND SCHOOL PERSONNEL CAN USE LOCATION-BASED SEARCHES TO FIND MEAL SITES, DATES, AND TIMES. THE APP ALSO ALLOWS FOR SEARCHES BY SITE NAME, ZIP CODE, AND CITY.

# ATTENDANCE in the early grades

Many of our youngest students miss 10 percent of the school year—about 18 days a year or just two days every month. Chronic absenteeism in kindergarten, and even preK, can predict lower test scores, poor attendance and retention in later grades, especially if the problem persists for more than a year. Do you know how many young children are chronically absent in your school or community?



### Who Is Affected

Kindergarten and 1st grade classes often have absenteeism rates as high as those in high school. Many of these absences are excused, but they still add up to lost time in the classroom.

1 in 10 kids

in kindergarten and 1st grade are chronically absent. In some schools, it's as high as 1 in  $4.^{\circ}$ 



2 in 10 low-income kids

miss too much school. They're also more likely to suffer academically.<sup>1</sup> 2.5 in 10 homeless kids are chronically

4 in 10 transient kids miss too much school when families move.









### Why It Matters

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.

Preliminary data from a California study found that children who were chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade were far less likely to read proficiently at the end of 3rd grade.

### What We Can Do



### Engage Families

Many parents and students don't realize how quickly early absences can add up to academic trouble. Community members and teachers can educate families and build a culture of attendance through early outreach, incentives and attention to data.



### Fix Transportation

The lack of a reliable car, or simply missing the school bus, can mean some students don't make it to class. Schools, transit agencies and community partners can organize car pools, supply bus passes or find other ways to get kids to school.



### Address Health Needs

Health concerns, particularly asthma and dental problems, are among the leading reasons students miss school in the early grades. Schools and medical professionals can work together to give children and families health care and advice.



### Track the Right Data

Schools too often overlook chronic absence because they track average attendance or unexcused absences, not how many kids miss too many days for any reason. Attendance Works has free data-tracking tools.

These are a few steps that communities and schools can take. How do you think you can help?
