

Willington Voters:

The Board of Selectmen was petitioned to call a Town Meeting to reject the recently ratified teacher's contract (just like 3 years ago.)

The Town Meeting is next Wed., Oct. 30th at 7pm (Town Office Building, Upper Level).

At this Town Meeting, those present decide what happens, sometimes by a show of hands, other times it's a referendum vote. Anybody can pass around a petition to force the Board of Selectmen to call a vote - in this case only 24 signatures are required to force the meeting... another 200 are required to force a

referendum.

Please help spread the word about the meeting. We encourage everyone to find out the facts about the contract and to understand what will happen if the contract is rejected.

Facts about the Willington Education Association (WEA) contract

- This is a valid contract that includes a 2.9% salary increase each year for 4 years. (According to an article in USA TODAY, pay raises in 2014 are expected to average 3%)
- Total 4 year cost of teacher contract with the current staff : \$427,472
- Average Annual Cost \$106,868
- **Insurance savings** from negotiating an HSA insurance plan instead of the current Point of Service HMO Health Plan: \$64, 800
- Actual Annual Cost for the 1st year: \$42,068
- The WEA and BOE members spent many hours between July 2013 and September 2013 negotiating this contact and were finally able to reach settlement through mediation. The final meeting ran from 4:30pm until 3:30am in order to avoid going to arbitration.
- The result is a contract that includes pay raises at the going rate but as a bonus includes a decrease in insurance benefits costs.
- Seventy-seven districts in Connecticut have settled teacher's contracts this year with average increases between 2.5% and 3.0% and most of them include HMO health plans versus the HSA plan.
- If the contract is rejected, the process will move to arbitration where they will look at what was negotiated to date, the town's ability to pay, and look at the average of towns in CT that have settled their teacher's contracts. **They would probably award a similar contract but it would cost \$20,000 for the town to go through the process.**
- The contract is available for review at the Willington Town Clerk's office.
- Remember the question is whether or not to reject the teacher's contract so if you **ACCEPT** the contract **VOTE NO**, and if you wish to **REJECT** the contract **VOTE YES**.
