In order to develop a partnership between parents, students, and Lakeview Middle School, we offer several workshops that are interesting to and requested by parents:


- Math Night

- Utilize Remind 101 messaging technology to keep guardians informed of specific class events, as well as general reminders to study topics with their students, check homework, etc.
- Involve guardians in class activities through Google Classroom's "Invite Guardian" feature. This will allow them to see student work, graded assignments, and current assignments.
- Participate in Literacy Night, Math Night, and Georgia Milestone Night to enhance the link between home and school.

At Home

LMS parents joined staff to develop ideas about how families can support students' success in language arts and math. Families may have other ideas to add to this list.

- Stay in contact with my child's teachers through conferences, emails, notes, phone calls, etc.
- Help my child with organization by checking backpack/agenda/notebooks daily.
