Parent Involvement Defined

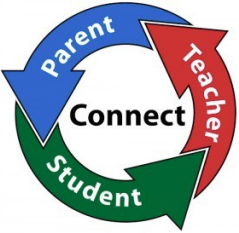

Studies show that students of involved parents are more successful in school. Convinced you don't have time? Continue reading... In the "old days", as the younger generation likes to reference the time period, an involved parent was that doting mom or dad who spent every moment hovering over their children. But this idealized characteristic of the perfect parent has never captured the true nature of an involved parent.

A loose interpretation of parental involvement is simply the time a parent spends with their child. That being said, wouldn't the most important characteristic of an involved parent be the depth of the *quality time* they regularly commit to spending with their children? While the definition of an involved parent may vary from person to person, or region to region, the goal of parental involvement has never wavered. A truly efficient parent involvement program attributes greatly to efforts to forge a stable, well-rounded educational environment for students.

Over the years, concern that the hectic lifestyles of parents impede parental involvement efforts has been overshadowed by the numerous after school and weekend activities of students. Consequently, a need to develop more realistic means for parents to spend quality time with their students has arisen. Simple, less time constricting means of getting involved as parents include:

- ✓ Attending meetings and conferences
- ✓ Joining school organizations
- ✓ Volunteering for school events
- ✓ Reading to your student's class
- ✓ Completing homework with your student
- ✓ Reading to your student and allowing your student to read to you
- ✓ Quizzing your student on study points before a test (This can be done anywhere)
- ✓ Creating games to help your student study
- ✓ Visiting the Parent Resource Center at your student's school to get material to help you support your student
- ✓ Contacting your student's teacher for helpful tips

Parent-Teacher Conferences: Tips for a Successful and Productive Meeting

Parent-teacher conferences are a chance to get to know your child's teacher. Most parent teacher conferences around 20 minutes so planning is the key for a successful conference. Parents should be prepared to share in two – way meaningful conversation. Be prepared with a list of facts about your child that will be helpful in the conference. Include things such as their favorite subject, how they react to the homework at home, their outside interests or hobbies, any medical condition or health need. It is also important to include other issues that affect schoolwork like a recent move, divorce or the birth of a child. Be sure to take a pen and notepad so you do not have to rely on your memory. Examples of questions you can ask the teacher include:

- * What is my child learning this year?
- * What are the teacher's expectations for homework and has my child missed any assignments?
- * Is my child reading on level?
- * Are there any special programs that suit the needs of my child such as Program Challenge or special tutoring for a subject that they may need help in?
- * Has my child been absent? If so has the makeup work been turned in?
- * How does my child respond to testing situations? What kind of tests do you give?
- * How does my child act in a group?
- * What is my child like in class? Is he or she social or do not interact with peers?
- * What is my child's learning style?
- * What is the best way to get in touch with the teacher? Email or phone

Remember that you are the expert about your child and the teacher is an expert about teaching kids on his or her grade level. Both of you will come to the table with ideas and opinions and might need to compromise. Parent-teacher conferences are also a great time to volunteer. Find out if there is anything that you as a parent can do to help the teacher.

Stay in touch with the teacher after the conference. Set up a time that you and the teacher can touch base again briefly to see if the action plan is working or needs to be altered. As children get older it is also a good practice to include them in parent-teacher conferences. Stay positive and look at the parent teacher conference as an opportunity to help your child succeed in their academic endeavors.
