The Livestock Evaluation Career Development Event, which will be held in November 2017, allows agricultural education students the opportunity to make accurate observations of livestock, determine the desirable traits in animals, make logical decisions based on their observations, and discuss and defend those decisions. Participants place classes of breeding and market

beef, sheep, goats and swine, and then give oral reasons to the judges as to why they placed each class as they did.

Franklin County Middle FFA advisor Anna Watkins also attended the Livestock **Evaluation for Teachers** course, which took place alongside the student camp. The purpose of this course was to educate and familiarize teachers with livestock evaluation while incorporating Animal Science Curriculum. It was taught utilizing UGA Livestock Specialist Jacob Seger, other experienced agriculture teachers, and collegiate judging team members. Class participants were engaged with facilitators to learn about preparing a competitive livestock evaluation team, correctly formulating and teaching students how to present reasons, analyzing Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs) and setting up practice classes for students to evaluate.

The Franklin County Agriculture Education program recently hosted a Livestock Nutrition, Fitting and Showing for Sheep, Goats, Swine and Cattle Workshop for educators at the Franklin County Agriculture Center, June 13 and 14. Franklin County Ag Teachers, Cale Wakins, Anna Watkins, and Eric Hickox, assisted in organizing and leading this two day workshop.

This two day training was designed to allow educators to enhance their knowledge of livestock, so that they could better assist students with their supervised agriculture experience programs. The camp was open to teachers from across the state of Georgia. The camp was led by Mr. Kent Benson, North Region Animal Science

Teacher, who also led discussion and demonstrations on sheep. Four other take on responsibilities, Agriculture Teachers from around North Georgia also led species specific discussions and demonstrations: Mr. Eric Hickox, Franklin County High School (swine), Mr. John Lastly, Madison County Middle School (goats), Mr. Josh Whitworth, Jackson County Young Farmers (beef cattle), Mr. Mitch Davis, North Hall High School (dairy cattle). Finally Montana Smith with Godfrey's Feed was present to discuss nutrition. During the two day training teachers not only learned from the panel, but were also given the opportunity to learn through hand-on experience with each species.

At the conclusion of this workshop, teachers left more equipped to assist their students in raising and exhibiting livestock. By

participating in livestock projects, students not only but learn how to take care of the animal. By doing livestock projects they have a good start to success down the road in this busy world. As a result of this clinic, their teachers are better able to promote those life changing experiences.

If any families in Franklin County are interested in raising and showing livestock, there are opportunities to show lambs, goats, beef cattle and swine projects. Opportunities are available to show in the fall and winter; age and grade requirements are different for each species and season. For more information about how your child can get involved, contact the agriculture teachers at the high school or middle school or the county extension agent.

#### FUNDRAISING & CHAPTER CREDIT

For the 2017-2018 school year, each fundraising opportunity will be coupled with a **chapter credit**. These credits can be used any FFA expense such as chapter shirts, FFA jackets, or FFA trips (Gravitopia, Discovery Conference, Ice Skating, etc.), camps and conventions or be used to pay for any other FFA expense.

The credit cannot be redeemed for cash and must be used on an FFA function by the end of the school year. Any credit that is not used by the end of the school year will be void. Credit will be handed out in the form of gift certificates, and it is the member's responsibility to keep up with his or her certificates. Certificates are not replaceable.

Pre-selling Country Meats snacks is a continuous way to earn chapter credit. Any FFA member can pick up a yellow order form from the bulletin board, pre-sell, and turn in their money and order forms on the last Friday of each month. Orders are filled the next week for members to distribute. We will also have opportunities for students to sell Country Meats snacks during November and March by taking 25 at a time and selling to friends and family. This extra fundraiser will hopefully help members in paying for trips such as Discovery Conference, Convention and Camp. For every 50 meat sticks sold, the member will receive \$5 in chapter credit.

Credit can also be earned by working at Young Farmer Auctions and selling Strawberries in February.
