## Why take AP classes?

- AP classes help students develop valuable college skills including: reading, writing, critical thinking, and studying skills
- 85% of selective colleges and universities state that a student's AP experience favorably impacts admissions decisions.
- Over 90% of 4 year colleges in the US provide credit or advanced standing to students for qualifying scores.
- AP students are more likely to graduate from college in four years or less, saving money between \$8,000 and \$19,000 in cost. For example, graduation rates for students who took AP English Literature were 62% higher in 2008.
- 31% of colleges and universities use AP experience in determining scholarship eligibility.
- Research shows that students who take AP classes are more successful in college, regardless of their AP Exam score.
- Central Gwinnett provides more than 18 options for advanced placement courses.
