 - Provide curriculum/testing information and academic resources aligned to the curriculum and testing in the Central Gwinnett Parent Center and at academic parent workshops
 - Provide all parents access to the 2014-2015 High School Complete AKS Booklet (online, electronically, or paper)
 - Provide opportunities for parent training on how to use the Parent Portal to assess and review individual student progress and testing results.

Opportunities for regular meetings, if requested by parents, to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions relating to the education of their child, and respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible;

- o Recruit parents to attend and participate in the CGHS Local School Council.
- Focus on designing a Parent Academy that will give parents a leadership and collaborative role with other parents in the school
- Review the results of the annual Title I Parent Survey and input received from the Title I Planning meeting to determine needed parent meetings.
- Provide opportunities for parent feedback at formal discussions such as parent-teacher conferences, Student Support Team (SST) meetings and Individualized Education (IEP) meetings.

- Providing opportunities for parents to meet with a student counselor or the Parent Instructional Coordinator to receive assistance in interpreting their child's testing scores
- **B.** Central Gwinnett High School will provide materials and training, such as: literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement and help parents work with their child to improve their child's achievement by;
 - Maintaining an academic Parent Center staffed with a Parent Instructional Coordinator (PIC) who is a certified teacher and will offer academic strategies for improved student achievement

 - Directing parents to community resources within the Lawrenceville and Metropolitan Atlanta area that might provide parents specific literacy, English, and technology, such as Gwinnett Technical College and Gwinnett Human Resources
- **C.** Central Gwinnett High School will provide training to educate the teachers, pupil services personnel, principal, and other staff in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs, and build ties between parents and the school, by:
