- A. <u>Scott Elementary School</u> will provide assistance to parents of participating children, as appropriate, in understanding topics such as the following, by undertaking the actions described in this paragraph –

- the State's student academic achievement standards;
- the State and local academic assessments including alternate assessments;

- · how to monitor their child's progress, and

Parent University: Parent University is a community collaborative that supports families. This initiative encourages parent involvement and participation in the education of our community's children and youth. Its objective is to maximize student learning by creating a strong bridge between the community and the school.

- Train "informed parents" to work together with schools to create paths for student success.
- · Provide support, guidance and nurturing to assure the realization of family success.
- B. <u>Scott</u> Elementary School will provide materials and training to help parents to work with their child to improve their child's achievement, such as literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement, by conducting topics from Parent University that will educate and train parents on topics in need of discussing as recommended by parents, Leadership Team, and from parent surveys.
- C. <u>Scott</u> Elementary School will provide training to educate the teachers, pupil services personnel, principal, and other staff in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with

Scott Elementary will also utilize the Pre-K Liaison Committee to assist in explaining the transition from pre-school to parents; and facilitate articulation meetings between pre-kindergarten and kindergarten teachers.
