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WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN SPEECH AND LANGUAGE?

Language is a code whereby ideas about the world are represented through a conventional system of arbitrary signals for communication. Language consists of the following:

- Semantics what words mean
- Morphology how to make new words
- Syntax how to put words together
- *Pragmatics* what word combinations are best in what situation

Language has two components:

- Receptive Language what we know
- Expressive Language what we can *say* (through speaking, signing, or writing)

Speech is the <u>verbal</u> means of communicating. Speech consists of the following:

- Articulation the production of vowels and consonants by the mouth
- *Voice* the way in which people use their vocal folds to change the type of voice they can produce
- *Fluency* the smoothness of flow with which sounds, syllables, words, and phrases are joined together when speaking

Children who are deaf/hard of hearing have unique issues that impact their ability to develop age-appropriate *language* skills. While the focus is often speech development, it is vital that we address the deeper issue of semantic *language* development for these children.

A full comprehensive speech/language evaluation is the only way to determine where a D/HH student is functioning. It is important to not only assess the student's ability to comprehend and name vocabulary, but the depth of language (functions, associations, categorizations, attributes, etc.) as well .
