Course Description:

The following activities and topics are included in our curriculum, which correspond with the Kentucky Common Core Standards.

- 1. Review of the writing process and Writing Criteria
- 2. Literary writing such as poetry, short stories, and/or plays or scripts
- 3. Personal writing such as the memoir, personal essays, and/or personal narrative
- 4. On Demand writing such as letters, speeches, editorials, and/or articles
- 5. Reflective writing such as journals, reflective response, and/or response journals and logs
- 6. Usage and Mechanics
- 7. Literary reading including short stories, poetry, and drama
- 8. Informational reading such as magazines, newspapers, Internet sources, etc.
- 9. Persuasive reading such as editorials, articles, speeches, ads, etc.
- 10. Practical/workplace reading such as forms, memos, etc.
- 11. Speaking, observing, and listening activities, such as oral readings, recitation of poem, oral presentations, etc.
- 12. Research using traditional and technological methods
- 13. Accelerated Reader Points
 - a. AR points are individualized based on a variety of student assessments.
 - b. AR tests must be passed with an 80% or higher for students to receive credit.
 - c. AR tests must be signed by Mrs. Lake or myself and placed in the student's red AR folder.
 - d. Bring AR books to class daily

Students will be graded using a point system. The following are various assessments and activites students will receive credit for:

<u>Study of Literature</u>- this includes exams, quizzes, on-demand, open response, group activities, culminating projects.

Writing Assignments- this includes paragraph development, essays, research

Accelerated reader points – points are individualized based on a variety of student assessments

<u>Personal Writing Journal</u> – Students will write journal entries regularly.

Each 9 weeks grade will be calculated as follows:

60% Exams/Summative Assessments 40% homework/ Daily Work/ quizzes/formative assessments

Requirements/Materials Needed:

Students will be required to have a three-ring binder exclusively for my class. Organization is a key life-skill and will definitely be beneficial in college as well as the workplace; therefore, it will be a key practice in my classroom. Students will also be required to have a personal writing journal. Writing is fundamental for knowledge growth and will be a common practice in my class. It is expected that students always come to class prepared with a pencil or pen, English binder, writing journal, and AR book. Coming to class unprepared causes delays for both students and teachers; therefore, students must avoid this practice.

Attendance/Make-up work and Exams:

Attendance policy will follow rules outlined in the student handbook. I DO NOT give make up work. Should a student need make-up work, he or she will be responsible for obtaining that work from the "Daily Assignment Folder" located on the table in the front of the room. Handouts given will be placed in a folder and labeled by the date. I will not remind students to get their make-up work. They must develop responsibility. Only students with an excused absence may obtain make-up work. Students will have five days to make up missed work. Point deductions will begin after the fifth day. Assignments are due on the DUE DATE. Any late assignment will suffer significant deduction. This is non-negotiable.

Tardies:

Our school firmly monitors tardies. All students must be in their seats and working on their bell ringer before the tardy bell rings. Each tardy will be documented with five resulting in office referral/after school detention.
