Worm friends Wiggle and Waggle enjoy their muddy home by singing, digging, and swimming together. Fun facts about worms and how they help plants to grow are included.

Arnold, Tedd. There Was an Old Lady Who Swallowed Fly Guy. Illustrated by the author. Cartwheel Books/Scholastic, 2007. 30p.

Buzz's grandma has accidentally swallowed Fly Guy!

Baker, Keith. On the Go with Mr. and Mrs. Green. Illustrated by the author. Harcourt, 2006. 72p.

The latest adventures of Mr. and Mrs. Green involve snacking on cookies, learning magic, and creating off the wall inventions.

Caple, Kathy. Duck & Company. Illustrated by the author. Holiday, 2007. 31p.

Each of the five short chapters gives insight into the humorous customer interactions of Rat and Duck as they run their bookstore, "Duck & Company."

Capucilli, Alyssa Satin. Biscuit and the Little Pup. Illus. by Pat Schories. HarperCollins, 2008. 29p.

Simple words and apt illustrations relate the adventures of Biscuit and a new puppy friend.

Cazet, Denys. Minnie and Moo and the Haunted Sweater. Illustrated by the author. HarperCollins, 2007. 45p. As cow pals Minnie and Moo think of gifts for the farmer's birthday, Elvis the Rooster disappears and Moo's freshly knitted sweater appears to be haunted.

Against all odds, a resourceful Puerto Rican tree frog manages to put a costume together for Carnival.
