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Dear NES Community,

I have been looking at our MCAS results from last spring and having conversations with people about the stories that the data tell us. I thought it important to summarize some of those stories for you below:



- Newbury Elementary School outperformed the state in every grade level on every test looking at the percent of students scoring Advanced and Proficient.
- 95% of the 6<sup>th</sup> Grade students last spring scored advanced or proficient on the English Language Arts test.
- 97% of all of our Grade 3 through Grade 6 students achieved a passing score of 220 or higher.
- ◆ According to the 2011 Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) determinations, 1,404 schools (82%) and 354 districts (91%) did not make AYP. Triton made AYP putting the district among the 9% of districts that made AYP statewide.
- ◆ The Department of Elementary Education now releases Student Growth Percentiles for each student so we can now look at achievement as well as growth for every individual student
- Newbury Elementary School strives to have every grade level reflecting high achievement and high growth to ensure we are challenging all students.

The NES School Council held its first meeting on September 26<sup>th</sup> and welcomed new parent members Maureen Heffernan, Stacy O'Shea and staff member, Bonnie Langendorfer. School Council agendas and minutes are posted on the NES webpage.



Lastly, it was great to see so many families come to our Open House events over the last couple of weeks. Your participation in our simulated morning meetings and "That's Me!" was greatly appreciated!


# Mix It Up at Lunch Day October 18th

# **News from our Classrooms**

#### **Band**



The Advanced Band has been working every Tuesday after school and it shows! Stage band is also up and running. Our first rehearsal was Tuesday October 11th. Our Winter Concert will be December 6th at 7 P.M. Don't miss it!

### Fourth Grade

Fourth Graders at NES have become cartographers! In social studies we have been exploring maps...What is a map? What are map features? Are there different maps for different purposes? The students are now working on a culminating mapping project in which they are creating their own island based on a theme of their choice. The completed map needs to show their understanding of the key components of a map. This is one of the many beloved projects in fourth grade.



# **Physical Education**



Our new incoming Kindergarten students have spent the first weeks of school learning Physical Education class procedures and the use of personal and general space in many game activities. Grades I-2 have also reviewed use of personal and general space while practicing overhand throwing skills in games such as "Clean Up the Messy Backyard" and team "Monkey in the Middle." Grades 3-6 have played Pillo Polo and basic soccer skill games. They have also taken their first fitness assessment - a timed 4-minute jog/walk.

# News from our Classrooms

#### Music

**Kindergarten:** In Kindergarten we are doing a variety of activities that emphasize singing, movement and listening. We use Beanie Babies to match vocal pitch, solo sing our names, explore movement games and songs with teddy bears, and play with jingle bells and rhythm sticks. We are also now learning some Halloween songs and games. A "star of the day" is chosen each week. Each child will have a turn! Watch for your child to come home with the "excellence in music" star.

**First grade:** In first grade we continue using Beanie Babies to match vocal pitch and take turns solo singing our names at the beginning of every class. We have learned a line dance "The Chimes of Dunkirk", a hand clapping game, "Alligator Pie" and a circle singing game "The Old Brass Wagon". We also took the story "Caps for Sale" and had fun adding musical parts to this story with xylophones, metallophones and unpitched percussion instruments. Now we are learning some new Halloween songs.

**Second grade:** In second grade we still enjoy using Beanie Babies to match vocal pitch and solo sing our names. We have sung the "Barnyard Song" with solos, danced to "Everybody's Body is an Instrument", played xylophones and did a clapping game to "It's

Fun to Be in Newbury", played the tubano drums to "Tiny Surfer", and are presently enjoying many Halloween activities.

**Third grade:** In third grade we have been doing some singing and mostly have focused on receiving and learning to play our recorders. Every child should practice at home about four times a week for at least 5 -10 minutes per day. Last week we began playing "Mary Had a Little Lamb". If a child can play this and the three notes B, A, and G are clearly heard, then the child receives his/her white belt.

**Fourth grade:** In fourth grade we have been doing lots of lessons with Orff instruments (xylophones, metallophones and glockenspiels). "Chattanooga Choo Choo" helped us to learn the sixteenth notes. We also learned about drumming with tubanos and unpitched percussion instruments added as ostinati. Now, we are using various Orff instruments to accompany Halloween songs.

Fifth grade: We began the year with an Orff lesson, singing and dancing to the Simple Gifts tune, (also known as Lord of the Dance). We have also reviewed many rhythms in a variety of forms using a game called "Zip Around". In October we will sing and play many Halloween songs including listening to Camille Saint-Saens "Danse Macabre", following along to his orchestral composition with our own listening maps. If anyone owns "Danse Macabre" and they want their own listening map for home listening, please feel free to ask Mrs. Peterson for a copy.

**Sixth grade:** We began the year with a lesson called "Pizza Rondo" which reviews whole, half, quarter, eighth and sixteenth notes. In this lesson we construct a multi-layered felt pizza and we sing and use Orff instruments. Next, we did several lessons on African music. We learned a rock passing game, a dance and a song with movement and African instruments. In October we will do some Halloween songs and a Halloween Orff arrangement.

# Music (continued)

**Chorus and Choir:** Just a reminder that our winter concert will take place on Tuesday, December 6<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 P.M. Remember to wear white shirts and black pants for the boys and black skirts for the girls. The children are asked to arrive at 6:30 P.M. and the concert begins at 7:00 P.M. We are looking forward to sharing our wonderful music with you!

4<sup>th</sup> grade beginner trumpets, flutes and clarinets: We have begun our instrumental lessons with our very own instruments! Everyone is doing a great job. Don't forget to mark down the minutes that you practice every day in your lesson book. If you practice four times a week for 5-10 minutes per day you will receive a sticker on the practice chart in my room. When you have

five stickers, you receive a bead. These beads will be put on the colored belts that are earned for playing songs and rhythms (similar to the belts that we earned for recorder playing last year). Keep up the good work!



#### Third Grade



Third graders are studying tall tales as a fundamental element of American folk literature. The tall tale's origins are seen in the bragging contests that often occurred when the rough men of the American frontier gathered. Tales of the west were often based on real-life events and history and then exaggerated over time so that the original story is "stretched" into a tall tale using similes and hyperboles. We are begin-

ning our own personal tall tales and writing as excitedly as a cat playing with catnip!

In Social Studies, students are exploring the regions of Massachusetts. We will be creating brochures to become experts on the regions of the North Shore, South Shore, Cape and the Islands, Connecticut River Valley, Pioneer Valley, and the Purple Hills. Please look for them in the hallway in the next week or two.



We are moving right along in Mathematics. Following the new Common Core, we've skipped over a unit in Investigations to unit 3 covering adding, subtracting, and the number system to 1,000. We'll go back to unit 2 later in the fall. Students are making great progress with math facts, and we're hopeful all children will make the end-of-year benchmark by getting through multiplication! Keep practicing those facts!

## If the shoe fits...

Tips from Irene Kelley, Physical Therapist

A properly fitted shoe or sneaker gives a child support and flexibility and helps prevent pain or injury.

# Tips for getting the right fit:

- Shoes should fit from the heel to the ball of the foot.
- ◆ There should be a thumbs width or 1/2 inch between the longest toe and the end of the shoe.
- Shoes should have an arch support inside.
- Don't use hand me downs for children's shoes. Shoes conform to the wearer's feet and will not fit a child's feet properly.
- Avoid backless shoes like "Crocs" or "Flip-flops". They do not offer enough support.
- Slip on shoes like "Merrills" should fit snuggly.
- Avoid shoes with heels as they are not safe.



# PREVENT Candle Fires Follow the Circle of Safety

Burn candles inside a one foot circle of safety, an area free of anything that could come in contact with the flame and burn.

Use candles in the center of an area one-foot in every direction free of anything that could burn, such as decorations, curtains that could blow around, other items on a table or bureau. Use a sturdy metal, glass or ceramic container.

#### Stay in the same room with burning candles; never leave them burning unattended.

Most candle fires start when they are left burning unattended. Don't leave a candle burning out of your sight or when you fall asleep at night.



#### Use candles out of reach of children and pets

Many candle fires are started when pets knock them over, or when children touch or play with them.

#### Keep all matches and lighters out of reach of children.

Store in a high cabinet, preferably a locked one. You wouldn't leave a loaded gun lying around and a lighter can be just as dangerous in a child's hand.

#### Teach everyone in the family the rules of safe candle use.

Children, teenagers, grown-ups and older adults should know the rules of safe candle use.

#### Candle fires have tripled in Massachusetts over the past decade!

Candle use has risen greatly in the past decade, but unfortunately so have candle fires. They have more than tripled in Massachusetts in the past ten years.

# Candles have become one of the leading causes of fire deaths in the home in this state.

Several people are killed, usually in their own homes, from candle fires each year.
