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
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Grade One – Habitats



She first knew she wanted to be a teacher when she worked with fourth grade students during her time in the AmeriCorps National Civilian Community Corps. Mrs. Paige's love for mathematics was fostered at an early age by her game-loving father. They played for hours and hours. Mrs. Paige believes that good mathematicians persevere through problem solving no matter how difficult the problem. She tells this to her daughters all of the time.
