
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# 6th Grade Update...

#### **ELA and Social Studies:**

In ELA and Social Studies, students are finishing their studies of Africa. They recently finished reading <u>A Long Walk to Water</u> and <u>Lost Boy</u>, <u>Lost Girl</u>. Students completed a project using Google Slides on the Chrome books where they documented, researched, and described the journeys the main characters took throughout the books. They also completed individual Africa country research projects that included learning about their country's road to independence and an open topic of research.





### **Mathematics:**




Sixth graders have recently learned about rational numbers and how to represent points on the coordinate plane. Students created mystery picture coordinate grid instructions for a classmate to solve. These projects are displayed in the sixth grade hallway (shown to the left are two examples). Students are currently writing and solving equations to solve multistep problems. Students are communicating their mathematical thinking and applying algebra skills as they come to understand the mathematical properties, how to simplify expressions, and how to use inverse operations to solve problems.

#### **Science:**


Sixth grade scientists are finishing their chemistry unit. Students worked in small groups to become experts on specific topics.



They designed instructional posters for their topic and taught the material to their peers. One group enjoyed the responsibility of finding instructional videos for each of the topics. The class presentations showed that students have a good understanding of the material. The posters are displayed in the 6th grade wing. A culminating activity was to use their knowledge to create a song/rap/poem/skit, highlighting the material learned, and performing it in class. We have very creative students! A favorite science activity is using the triple beam balance scales to measure the mass of objects. Students enjoyed learning to calibrate the scales and measuring with the metric system. Ask a 6th grader why it's important to state the mass in grams.


