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Third Grade Update...

Third Graders have had a fantastic year! We utilized a variety of new programs including Reflex Math and Empowering Writers. We visited Old York Historical Society and had an excellent in-house program from the Museum of Science. Third Graders have grown so much in their reading and math. We are hoping they can maintain during the summer and even get a jump start on 4th Grade! We recommend continuing to read aloud to your child during the summer. Reading aloud can be a great bonding experience as your child gets older and doesn't seem to need so much of your attention. We recommend the classics old and new: The Wizard of Oz, The Secret Garden, Encyclopedia Brown, The Magic Treehouse Books, and The Wind in the Willows. This is also a great age for hooking your child into historical fiction and nonfiction series as they are becoming interested in history and science topics at this age.

- · Reflex Math has been an excellent resource for many 3rd graders this summer. An individual login costs \$35 per year, a good value for a student who needs to practice math facts. www.reflexmath.com
- · <u>www.brainpop.com</u> and <u>www.brainpopjr.com</u> will remain active through the summer. The NES login is "newburyes" and the password is "brainpop." As the BrainPop people say, "The more you know, the more you know!" The third grade teachers would like to thank all of our amazing volunteers who supported our classrooms this year. We really appreciate all of your time and effort on behalf of the students.



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PE Update...

Spring PE activities in grades K-2 included a review of the use of space and creation of pathways. The use of space and pathways was then transferred to game play in "Stripe Tag" and "Interplanetary Tag." Frisbee throwing technique and throwing at targets such as bowling pins, nerf balls balanced on cones and boxes were lower grades manipulative activities. K-2 also began basic juggling with light, colorful juggling scarves.

Grades 3-6 have completed the NES Fitness Challenge which included the following – choice of the Mile Walk/Run or the "PACER," (a 20 yd. shuttle cardiopulmonary assessment with a decreasing time element), slide crunches and pushups. Benchmarks are pulled from the "Fitnessgram", a national assessment. Students will be recording their scores in the following weeks to take home.

Library Update...

In Kindergarten students made comparisons between <u>Pete the Cat</u> and <u>Splat the Cat</u> after listening to stories with both characters. Students voted for their favorite cat and Pete the Cat was the winner! In the coming weeks, students will discover the work of author/ illustrator Jan Thomas and create original stories based on her books.

First grade has been comparing different versions of folk and fairy tales, including *Goldilocks and Just One Bear* and *The Three Javelinas*. Students shared shorter versions of fairy tales by reading in small groups and sharing which elements of a fairy tale they found in their story. Grade one will soon become Mo Willems experts, he is our featured author for our final author study!

Grade Two completed an author study of Robert Munsch. We learned he was a storyteller before he was an author and would tell his stories again and again, sometimes hundreds of times, before his stories became books. He is one of our favorite authors on Tumblebooks. We return to focus on finding "just right books" to help prepare for independent summer reading selections.

Grade Three has been creating nonfiction superheroes. Students are working with partners and becoming "nonfiction" experts in a specific section of the collection and then creating a superhero based on the nonfiction area. Their superhero will protect the library collection from any villains that may cause chaos in the stacks!

Grade Four shared their original stories based on Jon Scieskszka and Mac Barnett's book *The Birthday Bunny*. Some of the re-written titles included Music Bunny, Robot Bunny, 80's Bunny, Burglar Bunny, Mexican "Fiesta" Bunny, Beauty Bunny, and many more original re-telling's. Grades 4-6 will be introduced the Massachusetts Children's Book Award Nominees for the 2014-15 school year. Students who participate in the program are encouraged to read some of the nominees this summer!

Grade Five students created Wordles (www.wordle.net) based on a selected genre. Students brainstormed descriptive words for their genre and five book titles to include in the word cloud. The Wordles will be displayed in the library for other students to read and will serve as a readers advisory tool in the future.

Grade Six students have been researching an author of their choice, gathering biographical information and interesting facts to share with classmates. We will be sharing reading ideas for summer reading and learning more about author R.J. Palaccio, the author of *Wonder*.

A list of Summer Reading suggestions can be found on the library webpage: www.neslibrary.weebly.com. Students are encouraged to select books that interest them and to create a reading routine during the summer months. The public library will be the place to discover fantastic book selections and activities. The Newbury Town Library will kick off their summer reading program on June 25th, learn more at http://newburylibrary.org/youth-summer-reading/.

To help keep the momentum of summer reading going, NES students are invited to participate in the Scholastic Summer Reading Challenge, an online reading program that invites children to log their reading minutes to help set a new world record for summer reading. The goal this year for schools around the world is to break last year's reading world record of 176,438,473 minutes! It's hard to believe the end of the school year is almost here. In response to your requests, we launched the NES PTA Annual Fund last fall. It was designed to enable

NES community members and their families to make a tax deductible donation each year in order to support key initiatives that aren't otherwise covered in the regular school budget.

Your donations can be targeted to specific areas like technology, enrichment activities or other areas of your choice. In fact, we received a \$12,000 anonymous donation to enhance the Grades 1-6 playground. As a result, new swings and a few other repairs will be added over the summer.

In addition to the anonymous \$12,000 donation, we've raised an additional \$5,000 to support next year's school activities.



Why are we funding Chromebook computers?

The PTA Walk-a-thon on June 6th will raise money for Chromebook laptop computers and a portable charging cart. With tight school funding and aging computers in the classrooms and technology lab, the NES Technology Committee identified Chromebooks as the most efficient way to provide our students with the technology tools they need. Wi-fi is coming to all district schools, but money has been allocated in the district budget for the computers in the coming school year. Therefore, the PTA has pledged to support this important initiative.

Google Chromebook Benefits

The NES Technology Committee has selected Google Chromebooks as the best value for NES's needs. Instead of having the traditional hard drive, Google Chromebooks are laptops that primarily store programs and applications in a technology cloud, accessible from anywhere there is Internet. Their relatively low price (around \$300) plus minimal technical support needs have made them the choice for many schools, including NES. The PTA's vision is to initially provide one portable charging cart with 30 Chromebooks at a cost of about \$10,350.


Value: On-the-spot learning

The portable Chromebook cart will be available for students across grade levels. The computers can go into the classroom for whole group, small group, or individual lessons. Individual log-ins, data collection, and virtual desktops will customize learning experiences to meet each student's needs. Cloud technology ensures students can access their documents from anywhere within the school as well as at home, a library, or anywhere with internet access.

In addition, projects and assignments will be designed to promote higher-level thinking and problem-solving strategies using computer skills. NES students will use technology to collaborate and create projects to demonstrate their knowledge and develop their communication skills.

NES and the PTA are committed to readying our students to thrive in the global economy, and technology is an essential tool. With Chromebooks, students and teachers will enhance the curriculum, research, create, and connect. We hope you will donate to this project.
