Specialist News

Physical Education News-

This fall Kindergarten children worked to understand the concepts of personal space, general game space, gross motor pathways and "stopping" by bending knees, and changing direction. First and Second grade students reviewed spatial concepts. Both grade levels then applied the ideas in low organization game activity. The manipulative skill of underhand toss and catch was another emphasis this fall with individual and partner challenges. As Halloween approached, a favorite beanbag game activity, "Haunted Mansion" was played by grades K-2. Grades K-2 are also working hard to use and apply social thinking concepts learned in the regular classroom in Physical Education class. "Whole Body Listening", "Thinking with Our Eyes", remembering "Expected Behaviors" and what is the "Group Plan" are vocabulary and ideas now integrated into PE instruction.

Grades 3-6 began the fall with a cooperative initiative task unit as a "mixer," get to know each other's activity. The next skill activity was backhand frisbee throw in the game activity "Freaky Frisbee". Presently 3rd – 6th grade students are completing the team activity of Pillo Polo. Fitness work in grades 3-6 has an added emphasis of upper body strength development this year. Pushup goals are set and assessed bi-monthly along with cardiopulmonary jog/walk goals. Specific muscle groups – biceps, triceps, shoulder musculature and abdominal obliques are worked with exercise tubing that is a fun challenge for students.

NEWS FROM MRS. PETERSON IN THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT

Kindergarten:

In Kindergarten we are doing a variety of activities that emphasize singing, movement and listening. We use Beanie Babies to match vocal pitch, solo sing our names, explore movement games and songs with teddy bears, and play with jingle bells and rhythm sticks. We have also learned some Halloween songs and games. A "star of the day" is chosen each week. Each child will have a turn! Watch for your child to come home with the "excellence in music" star.

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First grade:

In first grade we continue using Beanie Babies to match vocal pitch and take turns solo singing our names at the beginning of every class. First graders also sing a two line solo where I listen for their pitch, tone, diction, rhythm, volume and watch for "good singing posture". We have learned a line dance "The Chimes of Dunkirk", a hand clapping game, "Alligator Pie" and a circle singing game "The Old Brass Wagon". We also took the story "Caps for Sale" and had fun adding musical parts to this story with xylophones, metallophones and unpitched percussion instruments. We have also enjoyed taking a Halloween story and bringing it to life with sound effects made with voices and instruments.

Second grade:

In second grade we still enjoy using Beanie Babies to match vocal pitch and solo sing our names. They also sing a short two line solo and I listen for their pitch, tone, diction, rhythm, volume and watch for "good singing posture". We have also sung the first section of "You're a Grand Old Flag" with solos, danced to "Everybody's Body is an Instrument", played xylophones and did a clapping game to "It's Fun to Be in Newbury", played the tubano drums to "Tiny Surfer", and have just completed many Halloween activities.

Third grade:

In third grade we have been doing some singing and have mainly focused on receiving and learning to play our recorders. Every child should practice at home about four times a week for at least 5-10 minutes per day. All children played "Mary Had a Little Lamb" to receive their white belt. Our next belt, the yellow belt is made up of two parts, a rhythm part, on p. 14 in their books and playing "Jingle Bells". So far, the children can play G,A, B, C, and high D. Our next notes are low E and low D where we use our right hand. Soon the children will receive their yellow belt, and then "Jolly Old St. Nick" is the song for the orange belt. Happy practicing!

Fourth grade:

In fourth grade we have been doing lots of lessons with Orff instruments (xylophones, metallophones and glockenspiels). "Chattanooga Choo Choo" helped us to learn the sixteenth notes. We also learned about drumming with tubanos and unpitched percussion instruments added as ostinati. We also had fun using various Orff instruments to accompany Halloween songs.

Fifth grade:

We began the year with an Orff lesson, singing and dancing to the Simple Gifts tune, (also known as Lord of the Dance). We have also reviewed many rhythms in a variety of forms using a game called "Zip Around". In October we sang and played many Halloween songs, including listening to Camille Saint-Saens "Danse Macabre", following along to his orchestral composition with our own listening maps. If anyone owns "Danse Macabre" and they want their own listening map for home listening, please feel free to ask Mrs. Peterson for a copy.

Sixth grade:

We began the year with a lesson called "Pizza Rondo" which reviews whole, half, quarter, eighth and sixteenth notes. In this lesson we construct a multi-layered felt pizza and we sing and use Orff instruments. Next, we did several lessons on African music. We learned a rock passing game, a dance and a song with movement and African instruments. In October we learned some Halloween songs with Orff arrangements.

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Chorus and Choir:

Just a reminder that our winter concert will take place on Tuesday, December 2nd at 7:00. Remember to wear white shirts and black pants for the boys and black skirts for the girls. The children are asked to arrive at 6:30 and the concert begins at 7:00. We are looking forward to sharing our wonderful music with you!

4th grade beginner trumpets, flutes and clarinets:

We have begun our instrumental lessons with our very own instruments! Everyone is doing a great job. Don't forget to mark down the minutes that you practice every day on your practice sheet. If you practice four times a week for 10 minutes per day, then I will give you a sticker on the practice chart in my room. When you have five stickers, then you can have a bead. These beads will be put on the colored belts that are earned for playing songs and rhythms, (similar to the belts that we earned for recorder playing last year). Keep up the good work!


Library

Technology

Students are receiving technology instruction every week in the computer lab, so that they will be more independent learners in using computers for all subjects by 4th, 5th and 6th grade. All students will gain skills in using computers in research, writing, math, graphing, drawing, typing, as well as presentation software and internet safety.

6th graders have spent the last few weeks understanding global time- zones, viewing a series of videos explaining how we came to use standardize time around the world and base the time in Greenwich England, otherwise known as GMT. They have used online maps to figure out time in all parts of the world, including going over the international date line. They have also used online databases to verify the changing times around the world. While many of our students may not travel far, the chances of them working, playing or needing to speak to people in other countries, via Face-Time, or Skype, may prove to be a very necessary skill for their future.

5th graders are beginning some Excel work on finding mean, median and mode using Excel and the Boston Bruins stats. We have just completed our internet safety syllabus, which focused on potential risks and rewards of online communications as well as recognizing bullying online and when to stand up for yourself and others.

4th graders have just completed a unit on internet safety and are now being introduced to the Excel program. Many students tell me their parents use Excel at home. It is a lifelong skill. The students have learned how to collect data and turn it into a meaningful graph. They are now learning the algorithms necessary in Excel to have the program execute the addition, subtraction, division, and multiplication needed to perform math problems using the program. It feels a little like having a magic calculator, no numbers are too large.

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3rd graders spend a good deal of the year trying to gain competence on the keyboard for their increasing time on computers in school. We use a program called Type to Learn 4, which is an online software that monitors progress by keeping track of words per minute and accuracy. The students are slowly introduced to new letters through lessons and are allowed to play games practicing the new letters learned. They should be practicing at home on one of the online websites I have shown them on my website.

2nd graders are learning how to create a table, select, enlarge, and color shapes to put in the table. They are using the table to collect data about shapes in the school environment and turning the data they find into graphs. This is all good ground work for later use of the Excel program, manipulating numbers.

1st graders are learning to use a program called The Graph Club to do various kinds of graphing. We began with an online haunted Halloween walk, collecting data about ghosts, witches, bats, etc. on the walk. The students then turned that data into both a pictograph and bar graph. This week they are using a ruler to measure their pencils and four other pencils to create a graph to show the comparative size of each pencil, while labeling the graph with an appropriate title.

Kindergarteners enjoying our much loved Kid Pix program to both draw shapes and pictures as well as add letters and numbers using the keyboard. We also learned that the enter key moves you onto the next line.

Our use of computers at NES has really increased since getting Wi-Fi all around the school. The Chrome Book cart enables students to do so much more of their regular classroom work on a computer. It is fun to be able to move around the room without wires. Our tech helpers help with moving the computers around to each classroom. They are the best!

Art at NES

Is it really mid November? Time flies when you're busy, and we surely have been busy in room 166!

Kindergarteners began their art adventures at NES with the traditional mosaic project. Next came tissue paper Autumn Trees and Indian Corn paintings. I'm so happy that all students have art shirts to protect their clothes!

First Graders began the year with a drawing project. The theme was favorite animals or favorite foods. Next, we colored large autumn leaves with warm colored tissue paper and made cool colored backgrounds for them. Jack-o-Lanterns that display many sets of opposites were a popular collage project for Halloween. We are now easing into the winter season by designing matching mittens and coloring them with patterns.





Second Grade students also began the year by drawing their favorite foods or animals. They learned about the artist Pablo Piccaso and painted flowers inspired by his artwork. They are just now finishing torn paper collages of autumn trees.

Fantasy creatures was the theme for **third grade** drawings. They kept their imaginations active while forming monster heads from Model Magic. Those mini sculptures were glued on popsicle sticks, slid into a piece of paper and then bodies

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and settings were designed around them. Now, they are working on a mixed media collage for the Holiday Season.

Fourth Grade students learned about landscapes and still life. They chose one or the other and drew a picture from memory or imagination. They worked with tints and shades to paint beautiful trees. Halloween greeting cards were constructed collage style. Presently, students are designing and coloring imaginary frogs from outer space!







Fifth Graders began the year by drawing a picture with a theme of their own choice. These pictures were sent to Silver Graphis as part of the all school fundraiser through the PTA. As an added component, fifth grade drawing will be turned into tiles and the PTA will purchase one for each child. The tiles will be mounted and hung in the school as a lasting legacy. Kids had fun making 3-D wall monsters that graced the hallways for Halloween. Students who finished early were encouraged to make mini versions of this project. Students are now learning about the artist, Alexander Calder, and experimenting with wire portrait construction.





In **Sixth Grade**, students learned about geometry, radial symmetry and color theory while making drawings that were then sent to Silver Graphics. They studied human proportions while drawing Halloween skeletons. The "unnaturalnatural" artwork of Andy Goldsworthy was introduced and students were invited to try his style at environmental camp and at home.
