Third Grade News

Third Grade is off to a great start! We have been practicing the routines of school and spending some time getting to know each other through morning meetings and a variety of getting to know you games and activities.

In Math: We are working hard on fluency of addition and subtraction facts. Students are practicing adding and subtracting large numbers in isolation, in story problems and through math games like "Close to 100." We are also working with place value using base ten blocks. Our upcoming focus will be rounding to the tens and hundreds places and on using estimation skills.

In Reading: Teachers have recently completed the first round of reading assessments. These results will guide us in our planning of whole-class lessons and small group guided reading. Our first reading focus is on Metacognition or "Reading is Thinking." We are practicing the routines of independent reading, guided reading and fluency groups. Our current Fundations Unit has a focus on the rules of adding suffixes.

In Writing: We have kicked off the year with Empowering Writers. Students are learning about the different genres of writing that will be our third grade focus. These include: Narrative, Expository and Persuasive/Opinion writing.

In Science: Third Graders are learning about the life cycle of plants! Students will be participating in a variety of hands-on lessons including: dissecting a seed, planting and monitoring a pea or bean plant, and designing their own life cycle diagram.

In Social Studies: Students are learning about the great state of Massachusetts. They have learned all about the symbols of the state, and are now learning the state song and all about the natural resources, wildlife, and landmarks in different parts of Massachusetts. Our next unit will have an historical focus on early native people, and the landing of the Mayflower.

Thanks, Institution for Savings



Health and Wellness at NES

As we move into a time of year with various classroom celebrations, it is a nice time to review the Triton Health and Wellness Policy. Below, please find the purpose of the policy as well as the guidelines for foods and beverages served at school. Thank you for your adherence to this policy to ensure the well being of all of our students.

Purpose: The Triton Regional School District (TRSD) is committed to promoting health and wellness for the students and staff within the school community. TRSD supports guidelines for nutrition education, physical activity, food and beverages sold and served within our schools, and the establishment of a District Wellness Advisory Committee (WAC).

Guidelines for Foods and Beverages Served

□ At the secondary level, particularly at the middle school, food free parties and celebrations should be strongly encouraged and promoted.

Did you know?

☐ Food as a reward in all classrooms is strongly discouraged.

- ☐ The use of food within the curriculum or for special school events must be approved by the building Principal and school nurse, and only when it has been determined that other instructional tools and accommodations cannot be substituted.
- □ School-based marketing will be consistent with nutrition education and health promotion. As such, schools will limit food and beverage marketing to the promotion of foods and beverages that meet the nutrition standards for meals or for foods and beverages sold individually (below).
- □ School-based marketing of brands promoting predominantly low-nutrition foods and beverages is prohibited. The promotion of healthy foods, including fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy products is encouraged.
