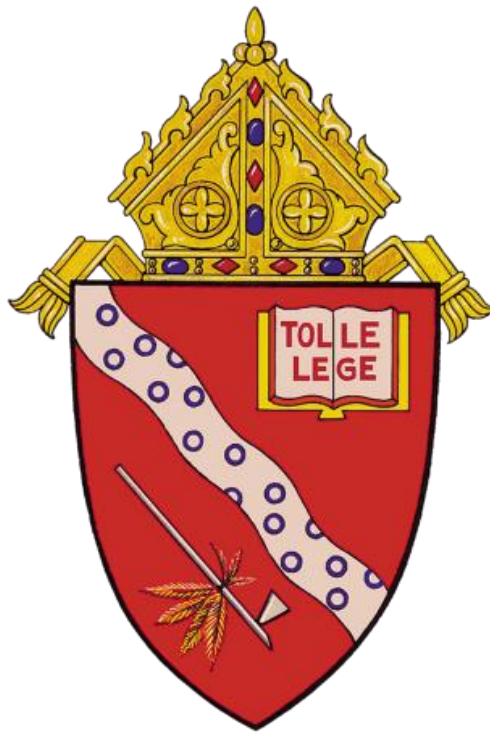

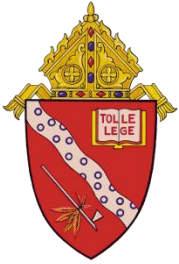

INTRODUCTION TO STANDARDS BASED GRADING

The Diocese of Kalamazoo, Office of Schools, has adopted a standards-based approach to reporting student progress toward grade-level goals. Students receiving this report of Student Progress/Performance will no longer be given a traditional overall achievement grade in each content area. Instead, levels of proficiency will be given for each standard that is taught and assessed during any one marking period.

The academic proficiency scale is: **+**: **Proficient**; **/**: **Partially Proficient**; **-**: **Not Proficient**.

DEFINITIONS OF PROFICIENCY LEVELS

At the elementary level, there are 4 standards-based reporting periods. For the first 3 reporting periods, students are evaluated based on expected progress at that particular point in the school year. In other words, students who receive a “+” or “Proficient” are performing at the level expected for their grade level at this point in the school year. Students receiving “-” or “Not Proficient” are performing below the level expected for their grade level at this point in the school year. In the final reporting period, the report card proficiency level reflects a student’s achievement of grade-level standards in all content areas.

Standards for Reading, Mathematics, and English Language Arts are correlated with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and aligned with the draft benchmarks for the Michigan Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCE). These standards define what students should know and be able to do at the end of each grade.

Proficiency levels are broadly defined as follows:

Proficient (+) The student demonstrates **consistent understanding and application** of the academic content and skills tested. The student requires no support in instructional settings to demonstrate proficiency.

Partially Proficient (/) The student demonstrates **general understanding but inconsistent application** of the academic content and skills tested. The student requires some support in instructional settings to demonstrate understanding and mastery of the content and skills.

Not Proficient (-) The student demonstrates **a lack of understanding** of the academic content and skills tested. The student requires significant support in instructional settings to demonstrate consistent understanding and mastery of the content and skills.

A blank in any square indicates the skill has not been assessed during the particular quarter.

Adjusted Curriculum (AC) The student receives grade level accommodations for this skill in order to demonstrate understanding and mastery of the content and skills.

Modified Curriculum (MC) The student receives non-grade level accommodations.

KINDERGARTEN THEOLOGY

In Kindergarten, students begin to understand that “God, who loves me, is with me always and everywhere.” Providing regular opportunities to point out where we see God at work will be helpful to the young child. Students at this age begin to develop an understanding that there are right and wrong choices.

CREED

- Recognize God as Father and Creator
- Understand that Jesus was sent by God and he lived, died, and rose for us
- Know that Mary is the Mother of Jesus, Joseph was his foster father, and together they make up the Holy Family

MORAL DEVELOPMENT

- Be aware that they are loved and created uniquely by God
- Realize there are right and wrong choices and that we must avoid sin in order not to break our relationship with God

SACRAMENTS

- Know that we become members of God’s family through Baptism
- Understand that Jesus is with us in a special way during Mass
- Recognize liturgical seasons, colors, and gesture

PRAYER AND WORSHIP

- Be able to recite: Sign of the Cross, Our Father, Hail Mary, Angel of God, Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer, and special words of prayer such as Alleluia, Holy, holy, holy, Glory to God, Amen, Thank-you God, and I love you God
- Participate in spontaneous prayer, gesture, song, and reflective silence

SCRIPTURE

- Know that the bible is a special book where God speaks to us
- Develop a love for God in Sacred Scripture
- Is familiar with the bible accounts of Creation and Noah’s Ark, the Infancy Narratives, as well as the Parables of the Kingdom of Heaven, and the Last Supper through the Resurrection.

KINDERGARTEN ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

READING

In Kindergarten, children are being prepared for the beginning stages of reading. They connect letters to letter sounds, and learn how letters combine to make words. Through read-alouds, and opportunities to practice reading, they gain meaning from text, identify parts of a story, and listen to the sound of reading.

FOUNDATIONAL SKILLS

- Print concepts
 - Demonstrate understanding of the organization and basic features of print.
- Phonological awareness
 - Demonstrate understanding of spoken words, syllables, and sounds (phonemes).
- Phonics and Word Recognition
 - Know and apply grade-level phonics and word analysis skills in decoding words.
- Fluency
 - Read emergent-reader texts with purpose and understanding.

LITERATURE

- Key Ideas and Details
 - With prompting and support, ask and answer questions about key details in a text.
 - With prompting and support, retell familiar stories, including key details.
 - With prompting and support, identify characters, settings, and major events in a story.
- Craft and Structure
 - Ask and answer questions about unknown words in a text.
 - Recognize common types of texts (e.g., storybooks, poems).
 - With prompting and support, name the author and illustrator of a story and define the role of each in telling the story.
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - With prompting and support, describe the relationship between illustrations and the story in which they appear (e.g., what moment in a story an illustration depicts).
 - With prompting and support, compare and contrast the adventures and experiences of characters in familiar stories.

INFORMATIONAL TEXT

- Key Ideas and Details
 - With prompting and support, ask and answer questions about key details in a text.
 - With prompting and support, identify the main topic and retell key details of a text.
 - With prompting and support, describe the connection between two individuals, events, ideas, or pieces of information in a text.

- Craft and Structure
 - With prompting and support, ask and answer questions about unknown words in a text.
 - Identify the front cover, back cover, and title page of a book.
 - Name the author and illustrator of a text and define the role of each in presenting the ideas or information in a text.
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - With prompting and support, describe the relationship between illustrations and the text in which they appear (e.g., what person, place, thing, or idea in the text an illustration depicts).
 - With prompting and support, identify the reasons an author gives to support points in a text.
 - With prompting and support, identify basic similarities in and differences between two texts on the same topic (e.g., in illustrations, descriptions, or procedures).

WRITING

In Kindergarten, children combine drawing, dictating, and writing to share stories, write to tell about topics and create opinion pieces that show their likes and dislikes.

- Text Types and Purposes
 - Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to compose opinion pieces in which they tell a reader the topic or the name of the book they are writing about and state an opinion or preference about the topic or book
 - Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to compose informative/explanatory texts in which they name what they are writing about and supply some information about the topic
 - Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to narrate a single event or several loosely linked events, tell about the events in the order in which they occurred, and provide a reaction to what happened
- Production and Distribution of Writing
 - With guidance and support from adults, respond to questions and suggestions from peers and add details to strengthen writing as needed
 - With guidance and support from adults, explore a variety of digital tools to produce and publish writing, including in collaboration with peers
- Research to Build and Present Knowledge
 - Participate in shared research and writing projects (e.g., explore a number of books by a favorite author and express opinions about them)
 - With guidance and support from adults, recall information from experiences or gather information from provided sources to answer a question

SPEAKING AND LISTENING

- Comprehension and Collaboration
 - Participate in collaborative conversations with diverse partners about kindergarten topics and texts with peers and adults in small and larger groups
 - Confirm understanding of a text read aloud or information presented orally or through other media by asking and answering questions about key details and requesting clarification if something is not understood
 - Ask and answer questions in order to seek help, get information, or clarify something that is not understood
- Presentation of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Describe familiar people, places, things, and events and , with prompting and support, provide additional detail
 - Add drawings or other visual displays to descriptions as desired to provide additional detail
 - Speak audibly and express thoughts, feelings, and ideas clearly

LANGUAGE

- Conventions of Standard English
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English grammar and usage when writing or speaking
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English capitalization, punctuation, and spelling when writing

VOCABULARY ACQUISITION AND USE

- Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words and phrases based on kindergarten reading and content
- With guidance and support from adults, explore word relationships and nuances in word meanings
- Use words and phrases acquired through conversations, reading and being read to, and responding to texts.

KINDERGARTEN MATHEMATICS

In Kindergarten, students focus on two critical areas: (1) representing, relating, and operating on whole numbers, initially with sets of objects; (2) describing shapes and space. More learning time in Kindergarten is devoted to number than to other topics.

- Counting and Cardinality
 - Know number names and count sequence
 - Count to tell the number of objects
 - Compare numbers
- Measurement and Data
 - Describe and compare measurable attributes
 - Classify objects and count the number of objects in categories
- Operations and Algebraic Thinking
 - Understand addition as putting together and adding to, and understand subtraction as taking apart and taking from
- Number and Operations in Base Ten
 - Work with numbers 11-19 to gain foundations for place value
- Measurement and Data
 - Describe and compare measurable attributes
 - Classify objects and count the number of objects in categories
- Geometry
 - Identify and describe shapes
 - Analyze, compare, create, and compose shapes

FIRST GRADE THEOLOGY

In First Grade, students will demonstrate that Christ is always present in the Church, start to think of Jesus being with them at all time, and should be invited to turn to Jesus at any time of need. Student will begin to understand the need to forgive and ask for forgiveness from God and others.

CREED

- Identify that There are three persons in one God
- Understand God is our Father who made us in His image, loves us and cares for us.
- Understand Jesus is both God and man, and He is a model of how we should live. Jesus suffered, died, and rose from the dead. Mary is Jesus' mother. Mary, Jesus and Joseph are the holy family and Jesus' first family.
- Know the Gospels tell us about Jesus' life and teaching through the Bible.
- Know we are called to be holy, be with God forever, and be saints.
- Understand saints are models of living Gospel values. The saints help us to be holy. The angels are not saints. We learn about saints so that their lives can be a model.
- Know The Holy Spirit helps us live as God's children.

SACRAMENTS

- Understand Jesus gave us the Church and the seven sacraments
- Relate the sacrament of Baptism is the gateway sacrament and forgiveness of original and personal sin
- Know Christ is always present in the Church.
- Understand there are two main parts of the Mass: Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.
- Know the liturgical year celebrates the life of Christ, Mary, and the saints.
- Know Sunday is the Day of the Lord. We attend Mass on Sundays and holy days.

MORAL DEVELOPMENT

- Know that every person is unique and a precious gift in God's creation
- Understand friends and family are a sign of God's love.
- Appreciate helping and sharing imitates Jesus.
- Understand we are responsible for our decisions and actions.
- Understand The Ten Commandments are a gift from God
- Know there are right choices (virtues) and wrong choices (sins). They break our relationship with God or help it grow. God always forgives us. We need to forgive others.

PRAYER LIFE

- Understand how quiet times of listening help us to grow in our knowledge and love for God.
- Memorize prayers is essential to prayer life.
- Experience spontaneous prayer, and as reflection at the beginning and end of the day.

SCRIPTURE

- Understand more fully creation, God's love, and the life and death of Jesus.

FIRST GRADE ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

- In grade 1, children continue to learn about words and how to express themselves using spoken and written language. They write to share their ideas and explain what they have learned. They participate in shared research projects.

READING

In grade 1, children continue to learn skills required for the beginning stages of reading. They explore the relationship between different letters, letter combinations, and sounds. Reading becomes more fluent as they learn skills to identify words and gain meaning from text.

- Print Concepts
 - Demonstrate understanding of the organization and basic features of print
- Phonological Awareness
 - Demonstrate understanding of spoken words, syllables, and sounds (phonemes)
- Phonics and Word Recognition
 - Know and apply grade-level phonics and word analysis skills in decoding words
- Fluency
 - Reads with sufficient accuracy and fluency to support comprehension

LITERATURE

- Key Ideas and Details
 - Ask and answer questions about key details in a text
 - Retell stories, including key details, and demonstrate understanding of their central message or lesson
 - Describe characters, settings, and major events in a story, using key details
- Craft and Structure
 - Identify words and phrases in stories or poems that suggest feelings or appeals to the senses
 - Explain major differences between books that tell stories and books that give information, drawing on a wide reading of a range of text types
 - Identify who is telling the story at various points in a text
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Use illustrations and details in a story to describe its characters, setting, or events
 - Compare and contrast the adventures and experiences of characters in stories

INFORMATIONAL TEXT

- Key ideas and details
 - Ask and answer questions about key details in a text
 - Identify the main topic and retell key details of a text
 - Describe the connection between two individuals, events, ideas, or pieces of information in a text

- Craft and Structure
 - Ask and answer questions to help determine or clarify the meaning of words and phrases in a text
 - Know and use various text features (e.g., headings, tables of contents, glossaries, electronic menus, icons) to locate key facts or information in a text
 - Distinguish between information provided by pictures or other illustrations and information provided by the words in a text
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Use the illustrations and details in a text to describe its key ideas
 - Identify the reasons an author gives to support points in a text
 - Identify basic similarities in and differences between two texts on the same topic (e.g., in illustrations, descriptions or procedures)

WRITING

- Text types and Purposes
 - Write opinion pieces in which they introduce the topic or name the book they are writing about, state an opinion, supply a reason for the opinion, and provide some sense of closure
 - Write informative/explanatory texts in which they name a topic, supply some facts about the topic, and provide some sense of closure
 - Write narratives in which they recount two or more appropriately sequenced events, include some details regarding what happened, use temporal words to signal event order, and provide some sense of closure
- Production and Distribution of Writing
 - With guidance and support from adults, focus on a topic, respond to questions and suggestions from peers, and add details to strengthen writing as needed
 - With guidance and support from adults, use a variety of digital tools to produce and publish writing, including in collaboration with peers
- Research to Build and Present Knowledge
 - Participate in shared research and writing projects (e.g., explore a number of “how-to” books on a given topic and use them to write a sequence of instructions)
 - With guidance and support from adults, recall information from experiences or gather information from provided source to answer a question

SPEAKING AND LISTENING

- Comprehension and Collaboration
 - Participate in collaborative conversations with diverse partners about grade 1 topics and texts with peers and adults in small and larger groups
 - Ask and answer questions about key details in a text read aloud or information presented orally or through other media
 - Ask and answer questions about what a speaker says in order to gather additional information or clarify something that is not understood
- Presentation of knowledge and Ideas
 - Describe people, places, things, and events with relevant details, expressing ideas and feelings clearly
 - Add drawings or other visual displays to descriptions when appropriate to clarify ideas, thoughts, and feelings
 - Produce complete sentences when appropriate to task and situation

LANGUAGE

- Conventions of Standard English
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English grammar and usage when writing or speaking
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English capitalization, punctuation, and spelling when writing
- Vocabulary Acquisition and Use
 - Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words and phrase based on grade 1 reading and content, choosing flexibly from an array of strategies
 - With guidance and support from adults, demonstrate understanding of word relationships and nuances in word meanings
 - Use words and phrase acquired through conversations, reading and being read to, and responding to texts, including using frequently occurring conjunctions to signal simple relationships

FIRST GRADE MATHEMATICS

In grade 1, children learn the basic processes of addition and subtraction. They identify shapes, recognize patterns, and continue developing ideas in data.

- Operations and Algebraic Thinking
 - Represent and solve problems involving addition and subtraction
 - Understand and apply properties of operations and the relationship between addition and subtraction
 - Add and subtract within 20
 - Work with addition and subtraction equations
- Number and Operations in Base Ten
 - Extend the counting sequence
 - Understand place value
 - Use place value understanding and properties of operations to add and subtract
- Measurement and Data
 - Measure lengths indirectly and by iterating length units
 - Tell and write time
 - Represent and interpret data
- Geometry
 - Reason with shapes and their attributes

SECOND GRADE THEOLOGY

In Second Grade, students will be preparing for the sacrament of Holy Communion and there developing a relationship with Jesus has with them in the Eucharist. A second grader will understand that God made us in His image and likeness. They will develop a deeper understanding for right and wrong and that freely choose their actions.

CREED

- Understand there are three persons in one God. God is all-knowing. He is our Father who made us in His image. He loves and cares for us.
- Know Jesus is God's son who suffered, died, and rose from the dead to save us from our sins. Mary is Jesus' mother. Mary, Jesus and Joseph are the holy family and Jesus' first family.
- Appreciate Jesus is still present among us in God's Word, in the Church, through the priest, in the sacraments, and in the Eucharist. The seven sacraments were given to us by Jesus. Jesus gives us many gifts through the sacraments.
- Understand Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to be with us always, and gives us His help through the Holy Spirit.
- Understand Jesus' Law of Love: To love God and others. The commandments show us how to do this.
- Know because of Adam and Eve's sin, we were all born with original sin. Sin is a break with our relationship with God. Jesus was obedient. His obedience is a model for our lives. We have a tendency toward sin because of original sin. The devil and his cohorts try to tempt us. The Holy Spirit helps us to resist sins.

SACRAMENTS

- Understand the sacred liturgy of the Church is the work of the Trinity.
- Know a sacrament is generally a visible sign that points us to an invisible reality in heaven.
- Understand the difference between bread and the Eucharist
- Identify the significance of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter.
- Recognize the Bible is the book of God's word. We study various symbols used in worship.
- Review Baptism and learn the rite of Reconciliation
- Understand the Eucharist is a memorial of Christ's Passover. Only a bishop or priest can consecrate bread and wine. We become living tabernacles when we receive the Eucharist and complete our initiation into God's family.

MORAL DEVELOPMENT

- Understand all human life is created in God's image to show love and care to each other. We are created to be holy, to become saints.
- Know receiving sacraments regularly help us to make good choices.
- Understand the importance of Reconciliation
- Recognize God has a plan for our lives

PRAYER LIFE

- Attend Mass on Sundays and holy days
- Memorization of prayers, including the Act of Contrition and the Rosary, is essential to prayer life.
- We experience spontaneous prayer, and as reflection at the beginning and end of the day. The Holy Spirit helps us pray.
- Understand the five reasons for praying.

SCRIPTURE

- Understand more fully creation through scripture, God's love, the Good Shepherd, Reception of the Eucharist, and the life and death of Jesus.

SECOND GRADE ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

In grade 2, children continue to express themselves in writing. They improve listening and oral communication skills and continue exploring new topics by researching. Students add to their vocabulary and learn to write using correct capital letters and punctuation marks.

READING

In Grade 2, children continue learning the fundamentals of reading. Their skill level increases as they apply word attack and comprehension strategies to read different texts. By the end of Grade 2, children are expected to be able to read books with increasingly difficult text.

FOUNDATIONAL SKILLS

- Phonics and Word Recognition
 - Know and apply grade-level phonics and word analysis skills in decoding words
- Fluency
 - Read with sufficient accuracy and fluency to support comprehension

LITERATURE

- Key Ideas and Details
 - Ask and answer such questions as who, what, where, when, why and how to demonstrate understanding of key details in a text
 - Recount stories, including fables and folktales from diverse cultures, and determine their central message, lessons, or moral
 - Describe how characters in a story respond to major events and challenges
- Craft and Structure
 - Describe how words and phrases (e.g., regular beats, alliteration, rhymes, repeated lines) supply rhythm and meaning in a story, poem, or song.
 - Describe the overall structure of a story, including describing how the beginning introduces the story and the ending concludes the action
 - Acknowledge differences in the points of view of characters, including by speaking in a different voice for each character when reading dialogue aloud
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Use information gained from the illustrations and words in a print or digital text to demonstrate understanding of its characters, setting, or plot
 - Compare and contrast two or more versions of the same story (e.g., Cinderella stories) by different authors or from different cultures

INFORMATIONAL TEXT

- Key Ideas and Details
 - Ask and answer such questions as who, what, why, when, and how to demonstrate understanding of key details in a text
 - Identify the main topic of a multi-paragraph text as well as the focus of specific paragraphs within the text
 - Describe the connection between a series of historical events, scientific ideas or concepts, or steps in technical procedures in a text
- Craft and Structure
 - Determine the meaning of words and phrases in a text relevant to a grade 2 topic or subject area
 - Know and use various text features (e.g., captions, bold print subheadings, glossaries, indexes, electronic menus, icons) to locate key facts or information in a text efficiently
 - Identify the main purpose of a text including what the author wants to answer, explain, or describe
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Explain how specific images (e.g., a diagram showing how a machine works) contribute to and clarify a text
 - Describe how reasons support specific points the author makes in a text
 - Compare and contrast the most important points presented by two texts on the same topic

WRITING

- Text Types and Purposes
 - Write opinion pieces in which they introduce the topic or book they are writing about, state an opinion, supply reasons that support the opinion, use linking words (e.g., *because*, *and*, *also*) to connect opinion and reasons, and provide a concluding statement or section.
 - Write informative/explanatory texts in which they introduce a topic, use facts and definitions to develop points, and provide a concluding statement or section.
 - Write narratives in which they recount a well elaborated event or short sequence of events, include details to describe actions, thoughts, and feelings, use temporal words to signal event order, and provide a sense of closure.
- Production and Distribution of Writing
 - With guidance and support from adults and peers, focus on a topic and strengthen writing as needed by revising and editing.
 - With guidance and support from adults, use a variety of digital tools to produce and publish writing, including in collaboration with peers
- Research to Build and Present Knowledge
 - Participate in shared research and writing projects (e.g., read a number of books on a single topic to produce a report; record science observations)
 - Recall information from experiences or gather information from provided sources to answer a question

SPEAKING AND LISTENING

- Comprehension and Collaboration
 - Participate in collaborative conversations with diverse partners about grade 2 topics with peers and adults in small and larger groups
 - Recount or describe key ideas or details from a text read aloud or information presented orally or through other media
 - Ask and answer questions about what a speaker says in order to clarify comprehension, gather additional information, or deepen understanding of a topic or issue
- Presentation of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Tell a story or recount an experience with appropriate facts and relevant, descriptive details, speaking audibly in coherent sentences.
 - Create audio recordings of stories or poems; add drawings or other visual displays to stories or recounts of experiences when appropriate to clarify ideas, thoughts, and feelings.
 - Produce complete sentences when appropriate to task and situation in order to provide requested detail or clarification.

LANGUAGE

- Comprehension and Collaboration
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English grammar and usage when writing or speaking
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English capitalization, punctuation, and spelling when writing
- Knowledge of Language
 - Use knowledge of language and its conventions when writing, speaking, reading, or listening
- Vocabulary Acquisition and Use
 - Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words and phrases based on *grade 2 reading and content*, choosing flexibly from an array of strategies.
 - Demonstrate understanding of word relationships and nuances in word meanings.
 - Use words and phrases acquired through conversations, reading and being read to, and responding to texts, including using adjectives and adverbs to describe.

SECOND GRADE MATHEMATICS

In grade 2 children continue to learn addition and subtraction. They increase their knowledge of geometrical shapes and describe data. They learn to use measurement tools.

 - Represent and solve problems involving addition and subtraction
 - Add and subtract within 20
 - Work with equal groups of objects to gain foundations form multiplication
- Number and Operations in Base Ten
 - Understand place value
 - Use place value understanding and properties of operations to add and subtract
- Measurement and Date
 - Measure and estimate lengths in standard units
 - Relate addition and subtraction to length
 - Work with time and money
 - Represent and interpret data
- Geometry
 - Reason with shapes and their attributes

THIRD GRADE THEOLOGY

In third grade, student will know what it means to live in the Kingdom of God and understand His commandments. Third grader unites with Christ in offering that one's prayers and sacrifices can really help others; especially during Lent. Student will see how the actions of the saints point to the love of God, and their immense love of Jesus.

In grade 3, children will continue to apply word attack and comprehension strategies to read increasingly difficult text across content areas. By the end of third grade, children are expected to be fluent readers capable of reading more lengthy text.

 - Determine the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in a text, including figurative, connotative, and technical meanings.
 - Analyze how a particular sentence, paragraph, chapter, or section fits into the overall structure of a text and contributes to the development of the ideas.
 - Determine an author’s point of view or purpose in a text and explain how it is conveyed in the text.
- Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Integrate information presented in different media or formats (e.g., visually, quantitatively) as well as in words to develop a coherent understanding of a topic or issue.
 - Trace and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, distinguishing claims that are supported by reasons and evidence from claims that are not.
 - Compare and contrast one author’s presentation of events with that of another (e.g., a memoir written by and a biography on the same person).

WRITING

- Text Types and Purposes
 - Write arguments to support claims with clear reasons and relevant evidence.
 - Write informative/explanatory texts to examine a topic and convey ideas, concepts and information through the selection, organization, and analysis of relevant content.
 - Write narratives to develop real or imagined experiences or events using effective technique, relevant descriptive details, and well-structured event sequences.
- Production and Distribution of Writing
 - Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development, organization, and style are appropriate to task, purpose, and audience.
 - With some guidance and support from peers and adults, develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, editing, rewriting, or trying a new approach.
 - Use technology, including the Internet, to produce and publish writing as well as to interact and collaborate with others; demonstrate sufficient command of keyboarding skills to type a minimum of three pages in a single sitting.
- Research to Build and Present Knowledge
 - Conduct short research projects to answer a question, drawing on several sources and refocusing the inquiry when appropriate.
 - Gather relevant information from multiple print and digital sources; assess the credibility of each source; and quote or paraphrase the data and conclusions of others while avoiding plagiarism and providing basic bibliographic information for sources.
 - Draw evidence from literary or informational texts to support analysis, reflection and research.
- Range of Writing
 - Write routinely over extended time frames (time for research, reflection, and revision) and shorter time frames (a single sitting or a day or two) for a range of discipline-specific tasks, purposes, and audiences.

SPEAKING AND LISTENING

- Comprehension and Collaboration
 - Engage effectively in a range of collaborative discussions (one-on-one, in groups, and teacher-led) with diverse partners on *grade 6 topics, texts, and issues*, building on others' ideas and expressing their own clearly.
 - Interpret information presented in diverse media and formats (e.g., visually, quantitatively, orally) and explain how it contributes to a topic, text, or issue under study.
 - Delineate a speaker's argument and specific claims, distinguishing claims that are supported by reasons and evidence from claims that are not.
- Presentation of Knowledge and Ideas
 - Present claims and findings, sequencing ideas logically and using pertinent descriptions, facts, and details to accentuate main ideas or themes; use appropriate eye contact, adequate volume, and clear pronunciation.
 - Include multimedia components (e.g., graphics, images, music, sound) and visual displays in presentations to clarify information.
 - Adapt speech to a variety of contexts and tasks, demonstrating command of formal English when indicated or appropriate.

LANGUAGE

- Conventions of Standard English
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English grammar and usage when writing or speaking.
 - Demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English capitalization, punctuation, and spelling when writing.
- Knowledge of Language
 - Use knowledge of language and its conventions when writing, speaking, reading, or listening.
- Vocabulary Acquisition and Use
 - Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words or phrases based on *grade 6 reading and content*, choosing flexibly from a range of strategies.
 - Demonstrate understanding of figurative language, word relationships, and nuances in word meanings.
 - Acquire and use accurately grade-appropriate general academic and domain-specific words and phrases; gather vocabulary knowledge when considering a word or phrase important to comprehension or expression.

SIXTH GRADE MATHEMATICS

In grade 6, children apply their basic skills in a range of application problems. They use their skills to solve problems or predict results.

- The Number System
 - Apply and extend previous understandings of multiplication and division to divide fractions by fractions.
 - Compute fluently with multi-digit numbers and find common factors and multiples.
 - Apply and extend previous understandings of numbers to the system of rational numbers.
- Expressions and Equations
 - Apply and extend previous understandings of arithmetic to algebraic expressions.
 - Reason about and solve one-variable equations and inequalities.
 - Represent and analyze quantitative relationships between dependent and independent variables.
- Ratios and Proportional Relationships
 - Understand ratio concepts and use ratio reasoning to solve problems.
- Geometry
 - Solve real-world and mathematical problems involving area, surface area, and volume.
- Statistics and Probability
 - Develop understanding of statistical variability.
 - Summarize and describe distributions.
