8th Graders: Time to Make Your Choice

Online applications for Saint Louis Public Schools opened earlier this month, and many of our 8th grade students have already been seeking recommendations from their current and past teachers, as required by SLPS. We encourage you to get online and apply for your child's school of choice as soon as possible. Copy and paste this link: http://slpsmagnetschools.org/site.php into your browser. The initial registration period ends on November 3. The first lottery pull is on November 17, and acceptance notices will be emailed out on November 22. Attached to this newsletter is a comprehensive document, thank you Mrs. Lydon, detailing the registration process for high schools in the St. Louis area.

If you are still unsure about which high school to choose, I would encourage you to plan a day to have your son or daughter shadow at a high school. Most area schools will arrange to place your student with a current student and shadow them for a day. It is a great way for your child to get a "feel" for the school, and you can do this at more than one school. These days are counted as excused absences, as long as you bring in some type of documentation from the school of your child's visit. That documentation could be a note from their office or even a visitor pass. Just turn that into Ms. Zamudio in the Middle School office.

Important note about dismissal and the YMCA

We are kindly asking parents and students to be respectful of our neighbors at the YMCA. Their building and grounds are not meant to be used as a pick up point for students as they have membership rules and regulations regarding their building and grounds use.

Their policy is that MEMBERS under the age of 13 cannot be present at the YMCA without a person 18 years or older to supervise them. They especially cannot allow NON MEMBERS under the age of 13 to be there either. Also, 13 year old NON MEMBERS can only be in the building with a signed waiver from a parent and they are

only admitted on a guest pass 2 times per calendar year. The YMCA is for members only afterschool and their lobby is not a place for students to "hang out". The parking lot is also not a place for parents to pick up their children after school.

Healthy Kids Express Asthma Van Visits PCS Monthly

The Healthy Kids Express Asthma Van, supported by St. Louis Children's Hospital, visits PCS monthly to give FREE onsite asthma services to PCS students who have signed up for the program. Those services include visits and phone calls with an Asthma Nurse Specialist, asthma education for both students and their parents, & asthma equipment including mattress covers for your child's bed and albuterol spacers.

#1 in Civil Rights

Mondays, Wednesdays-Sundays, 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Continues through April 15, 2018

St. Louis' history as a wellspring of civil rights activism is deep and impressive. Dred and Harriet Scott's legal fight to be free, Mary Meachum's bold actions leading slaves to freedom across the Mississippi River, the Jefferson Bank protesters organizing to get access to better jobs, Percy Green and the daring VP Ball invaders who challenged St. Louis' powerful elite and the exclusionary nature of their private party — all of these people fought the good fight in St. Louis. #1 in Civil Rights, the new exhibition at the Missouri History Museum (Lindell Boulevard and DeBaliviere Avenue; www.mohistory.org) chronicles the history of the civil rights movement in the metro area through artifacts, historical photos, oral histories, art work and actors' performances. Every key moment in the black struggle for equality is covered up to the present day, with artifacts collected by the museum staff following the killing of Michael Brown and the resulting civil unrest in Ferguson playing a major role in the exhibit. #1 in Civil Rights opens on Saturday, March 11, and continues through April 15, 2018. Admission is free.

Mission: Mars

Mondays-Saturdays, 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. and Sundays, 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

NASA is currently working toward the goal of putting humans on Mars in the 2030s, which is not as far away as it sounds. The space agency just last week opened the astronaut application process for the class of 2017, which indicates a certain urgency. If you're eager to see what the future holds, the Mission: Mars exhibition at the Saint Louis Science Center (5050 Oakland Avenue; 314-289-4400 or www.slsc.org) is the place to be. This interactive display is developed by the science center, Washington University and NASA and is divided into two parts. Mission Control gives you the chance to program and remotely drive a simulated Mars rover, complete with the time delay caused by the signal transit time between Earth and Mars. Mission Mars — Base lets you take on the role of an explorer on the Red Planet in the year 2076. You'll conduct scientific operations at key points using one of the science center's two rovers. Mission: Mars is open daily, and admission is free.
