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Turner Retires

Mr. Richard Turner, director at the Alcorn Career and Technology Center, is retiring after twenty-two years of service as an educator in the Alcorn School District. All of those years were spent in the education of students at the Alcorn Career and Technology Center, where Turner taught Metal Trades for sixteen years, served as a part time assistant director for two years while teaching, a full time assistant director for two years, and then as vocational director for four years. He holds a bachelor's degree in Trade and Industrial Education from Mississippi State University and his master's degree in Educational Leadership from the University of North Alabama.

Under Turner's leadership, the Alcorn Career and Technology Center flourished and was recognized in three distinct ways during his last year of service. The ACTC housed Mississippi's Career and Technical Student of the Year, Mississippi's Craft Instructor of the Year, and Mississippi's ACTE Career Guidance Award recipient. Any one of these awards would be special for any center, but to have all three in one year is absolutely phenomenal and has not been paralleled by any other center in the state.

During the time Turner was director at ACTC, several improvements were made to the campus. The Graphic Arts program was converted to Digital Media Technology and a state of the art lab was constructed in the summer of 2013. The shop areas were painted, the parking lot drainage issues were repaired, an additional classroom was remodeled, as well as various new pieces of technology were purchased.

Mr. Turner has played a large part in the night class programs at ACTC. He served as an adult night class instructor for 12 years, worked three nights a week as assistant director, and when he became director he continued to work one night per week. During Mr. Turner's time as director, the adult classes averaged over 400 students each year. ACTC houses the largest number of adult night classes of any center in the state.

When asked about his favorite memories and what he would miss the most about his job, Turner replied, "It is the accomplishments of students. My memories are in the students." and "What I will miss the most will be the association with the teachers and the relationships with the students."

When asked what his future plans might include, Turner replied that he would continue his private business in band instrument repair and looks forward to spending more time with family. He also added, "Fishing. Lots of fishing."

Turner's wife, Linda, is a retired educator from the Alcorn School District. They are the proud parents of three children: Clint, a machinist at Young and Daughters in Corinth; Whitney, a band instrument repair technician and shop manager in Sioux City, Iowa; and Ben, a process engineer for Gulf Stream Aerospace in Savannah, GA.



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Paleontologists For a Day

Ever expanding our horizons, Polymer Science students along with several friends of Polymer Science, journeyed far into the past when we visited the bottom of the sea, or at least what's left of it.

On May 3rd we travelled to Adamsville, Tennessee, to the Coon Creek Science Center, owned and operated by the Pink Palace Museum of Memphis, TN. Our gracious host was Dr. Michael Gibson, Geologist, Paleontologist, and professor at the University of Tennessee at Martin, Tennessee. Dr. Gibson is also a professor of Geology for the Mississippi Academy of Science Teaching, which is where Mrs. Parsons first learned about the fossil 'mother lode' of undersea fossils found at Coon Creek.

Before our adventure began, Professor Gibson introduced Coon Creek, its history and the types of fossils students could possibly find in the digging areas. Safety issues were discussed, for example: the snakes that could be found in the creek area. Eeeek!. We were introduced to the creek and the various layers of time that have been revealed by water erosion, and then we went to digging. We were off to seek ancient treasures!

Everyone found fossils of sea life, including, ghost shrimp claws, fossilized sea turtle waste, complete clams, scallop shells, snail shells, and many other types of shells including the Tennessee state fossil, Pterotrigonia (Scabrotrigonia) thoracica – named by the Geo Club at UT Martin, led by Professor Gibson.

John Shepherd had the largest find of the day. He and Professor Gibson safely removed the large shell from it s 100s of millions of years old burial site and John cleaned the shell and took it home. All in all we had a great host and instructor in Dr. Gibson, who taught us much, and made us feel very welcome.

All participants enjoyed the beautiful day and went home with ancient souvenirs from the Cretaceous Period.



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Polymer Science

Second year Polymer Science students mixed colors, painted various substrates, and tested surface coatings in the surface coatings unit. They tested various paints to find out how well they endure, sun, wind and rain, how well they hold up to scratches, dents, and abrasions, and how well they stick to various types of surfaces.

These students also completed the Composites Unit by finishing tests of their fiberglass hand layups, their pressure cured fiberglass hand layup and their vacuum cured hand layup. Data was collected for Modulus of Elasticity calculations and students compared results to determine the strongest student made fiber reinforced composites.

First year Polymer Science students completed labs for the year by growing crystals of potassium alum or copper sulfate. Students used a dip mold and poly vinyl chloride plastisol to dip mold a coin purse. Students also took a perfectly unpolished one inch acrylic cube and heated it, smashed it in a hydraulic press, drilled holes in it, put dye in the holes, reheated it, then sanded it and polished it until it shined.
