

Are Books the Magic Wands we've been Looking For?

1 Why do we even bother with reading? Many might even argue that we could be doing more productive things with ou time other than reading. However, there seems to be something magical about the power of books. Literature has the ability to transform, or at least convince our

imaginations that we've been transformed. Even though



many adolescent students and adults alike show a sense of disgruntlement toward "flipping the pages", they should probably consider how reading has side-effects that are often unattainable through any other measure.

Did you know that reading actually offers therapeutic benefits? In a recent study

2 conducted by researchers at the University of Liverpool, it was found that reading literature significantly decreased depressive moods and emotional issues. Participants, who were patients suffering with diagnosed depression, reported feeling more confident because of a reduced sense

of social isolation. After reading pieces of classic literature and poetry, patients were prompted to take an introspective view of the reading. In a group setting, a facilitator made the reading "come alive" as they applied what they read to both old and new life experiences. Because the participants were able to articulate shared feelings and experiences aroused by a text, they were able to understand a sense of camaraderie rather than loneliness. This simple concept of reading used as therapy doesn't have to be utilized in a group, medical setting. In fact, we could possibly trigger the same results on our own by applying what we read to our lives. Continued research studies have even found that reading can reduce stress by around 68%! That's a staggering number. Themes of classic literature are considered "classic" because they are universal and timeless. It's amazing what the ancient Romans or even Harry Potter can teach us about life, relationships, and the world around us. The peace we get from reading literature, which helps us to know that we're not alone in our daily struggles, can certainly be considered a top reason to be a voracious reader!

George R. R. Martin, writer of the famous reader lives a thousand lives before he dies...the man who never reads lives only Game of Thrones series once wrote, "A one." The true magic found within the heart of reading is that it allows us the privilege to transcend our present circumstances. Whether it be through taking a "journey" to a distant land through the eyes of a character or simply "walking in someone else's shoes", reading ultimately educates us. When we read about different places and cultures, we can better understand different perspectives. In turn, we are more likely to become empathetic toward those around us. When we don't understand a way of thinking, we cannot possibly understand their voice, reasoning, or struggle. By reading stories from those who lead very different lives than ourselves, we are able to more fully comprehend how the past always intertwines with the future. This idea alone beautifully illustrates why "deep reading" is necessary in order to reap the benefits of literary endeavors. When we read a text deeply, we aren't merely reading words, we are seeingthe stories in our minds. We are understanding what we read, and most importantly we are applying the stories to our own lives. Deep reading doesn't mean decoding difficult words and texts, but rather delving into how the lives, tales, and assertions of others immerse us into uncovering complex emotions and situations. Simply stated, reading is a concise way to travel the globe, uncover hidden meaning, and see how the lives of others are complicated by relationships, trials, and triumphs. Reading great literature can even remove our indifference



toward the suffering of others and make us into more compassionate, forbearing beings. 4 When deep reading occurs, we never truly emerge the same as before we started the story. This slow, applicable experience is considered by some to be what makes us "human". When we read stories of failure, disgrace, or even suffering, we learn how to combat our own, private demons. The characters in books teach us how to or how to

not handle the many peaks and valleys of everyday life.

Identifying with characters in stories actually teaches us a lot about ourselves and the relationships which we find ourselves in. In fact, a reader might even learn to be more determined, or persevere when they find themselves in the belly of the whale, if they are able to subconsciously tap into what they've learned from a book character.
