

Quoting and Paraphrasing

Quotation

1. Don 't make any changes.
2. Give the author 's last name at the end of the quotation.

EXAMPLE:

According to some, dreams express “profound aspects of personality” (Foulkes 184), though others disagree.

Paraphrasing

1. Explain the main ideas of something you read.
2. Write completely in your own words.
3. Show that you understand the source.
4. Cite the source.

EXAMPLE:



“An artist never draws a final picture on the first try.” (Soloff, p.3).

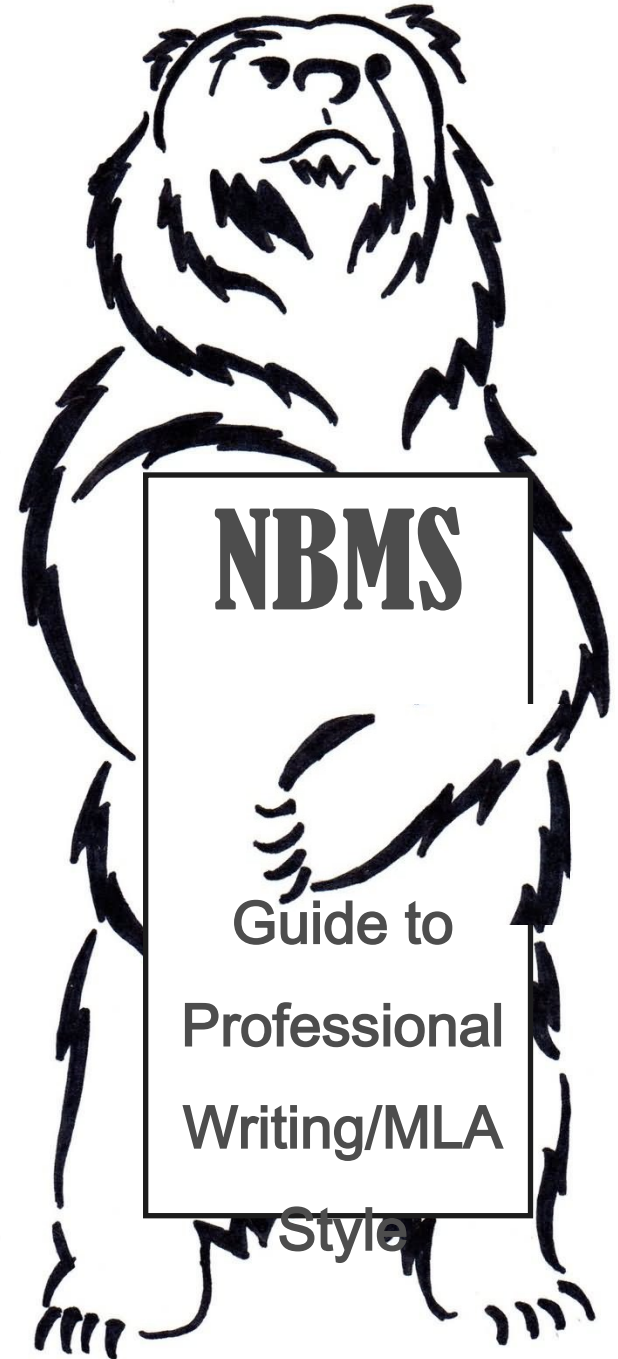

- * Plagiarism is taking someone else 's work or ideas & passing them off as your own.

- * Use direct quotation (don ' t do anything except put it in quotations and give the authors a

MLA Formatting

MLA stands for Modern Language Association. Students should always use MLA formatting for school papers and research assignments.

A few standards for the General Paper Formatting are...

Heading

- Your name
- Teacher ' s name
- Course name and Block
- Date (Day/Month/Year)

Font

- Times New Roman (12pt)

Spacing

- The essay should be double spaced (2.0)

Citations and Quotations

Some examples of citations...

Single Author Book

Author ' s Last Name, Author ' s First Name. *Title of Book*. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year Published. Media. Website

Title of Website. Sponsor of Site, Date Site Updated. Media. Date Site Accessed.

Newspaper

Author ' s Last Name, Author ' s First Name. "Title of Article. " *Title of Newspaper* Date Issued: page (s). Media.
