Fear Breeds Hatred for Muslim Americans

agreed with him. One person commented "why not do both", another commented "I vote both" and another said "how 'bout ovens".


In 2015 there were 260 reported hate crimes. One case is where a Muslim woman in Manhattan was standing in front of a store when suddenly she felt heat against the side of her face. A man had set her hijab on fire. Another example of hate crimes toward Muslim Americans can be seen in the hate received by Saba Ahmed, the president and founder of The Republican Muslim Coalition. In 2015 SABA Ahmed sported an American flag patterned hijab on Fox News while defending her religion and standing her ground. She received an enormous amount of hate and people were angry that she wore a flag as a hijab. "I just wanted to show that Muslim Americans celebrate patriotism, too", said Ahmed. Many Americans argue that Muslims are un-American but when wearing an American flag to acknowledge their religion and culture (as they should be able to) and demonstrate their patriotism at the same time, they still have a prob**lem.** It isn't unpopular to see American flag printed bikinis, pants, shirts, etc. so a hijab should not be a problem.

An estimated 3.3 million Muslims live in the U.S. and only a minute few have been involved in extremist behavior. Therefore, to blame ALL Muslims would clearly be ridiculous.




The End of A Season




Where are the Readers?

Oops! They Did it Again



Corruption in Nassau County

We've all heard of corruption in politics before, and it's clear that even today it's still a problem. But no one ever seemed to suspect that Ed Mangano, the Nassau County Executive would be accused of corruption, and would now face bribery charges. On Thursday, October 20th, Ed Mangano and his wife, Linda, were arrested due to their involvement in a bribery scheme involving a restaurateur (businessman) by the name of Harendra Singh. It was discovered that Linda had been receiving pay as a "food taster", a job that she wasn't even showing up for. Over time, though never having to show up for work, Linda had accumulated \$450,000. In addition to this, the Mangano family received free merchandise, worth over \$10,000, free limousine service, and allowance to hold fundraisers at Singh's restaurants.

In exchange for the merchandise, services, and payment to Linda, Mangano and Oyster Bay's town supervisor, John Venditto, would use their high rank in government to promote Singh's

business by providing loans and contracts guaranteed by the county. Once this was discovered, Mangano and Venditto were immediately taken to federal court, where they pleaded not guilty, but were charged with crimes including bribery, service fraud and development of fictitious stories to hide their corruption.

As a result of all of the charges, it will probably be hard for Mangano to achieve re-election in 2017. As of now, many other politicians in New York are already calling for the immediate resignation of Mangano from the local government. Mangano has been in service for many years, serving seven terms in Nassau County Legislature and having been elected Nassau County Executive since 2009. This is just one of the many stories that have been occurring all over Long Island throughout the past year.

Other occurrences of corruption include that of the Suffolk County chief of police, James Burke, who beat a suspect and constructed a cover up, along with Suffolk County Conservative Party Chairman, Ed Walsh, who had

been getting paid to gamble and golf instead of do his job. It is sad to hear that we can't always rely on the people that we elect, but hopefully any leftover corruptions will be purged from the government.
