On Tuesday, December 13th the Latin American and multi cultural clubs went on a field trip to the Hispanic Society of America Museum and Library in Washington Heights. The museum contains multiple works of art from Spain, Portugal, and many south and Central American countries. The first thing we did on the trip was learn about the history of the museum.

The museum was founded as a free museum and research library in 1904 by philanthropist archer Milton Huntington. We went to see the paintings and other works of art.



We saw paintings from the golden age (1550-1700) and the 19th century. One of the most famous paintings was by Antonis Mor; he painted a portrait of re Duke of Alba in 1576. Additionally, we saw "Holy Family" by El Greco in 1598. The museum also holds paintings and drawings by Francisco de Goya, who was one of the most inventive artists of his time.

We also went to the library and saw more than 600,000 manuscripts, documents, and letters dating from the 10th century to the present day.

Lastly, we saw an entire

room of murals that were painted by Joaquin Corolla y Bastida. He was an internationally renowned Spanish painter. These huge paintings were called "Vision of Spain". There are fourteen paintings in all, celebrating the diverse customs of Spain. It took him ten years to complete these works of art.

What is your daily routine when you come into the building?

I go a walk around the building first period. I do that just to make sure that everyone is in class and everything is in place to start the day. Everyday is very different! Sometimes we have incidents that happen that need to be taken care of. That happens quite often and I am also in a lot of meetings with different faculty members throughout the entire day. People don't realize just how much is going on.

How would you define your job description?

As a principal, you are in charge of lots of different things. You are guiding many people. You have to be well versed in instruction and in teaching practices. There's that whole aspect where you have to go in and observe teachers, monitoring their instructions. Then you also have to be an expert in curriculum and so you have to be able to meet with instructional supervisors and make sure that we are following the state curriculum. You also have to know a lot about how

to manage students' crises and so I work very closely with the guidance counselors.

Which would be the most difficult part of your job?

I'm the kind of person that really tries to stay organized. I think what has always been a struggle for me in every capacity is not giving up on certain things. It's very hard for me and I never want to give up on something even when the team will say "You know, that's going to be really hard to do". It's hard for me to give up on a project or student. That's always been very difficult for me, even when I was an assistant principal and teacher... dealing with at risk students, you never want to give up on them. Everyone on the administrative team, we go into this profession because we love working with youth and I think it takes a special person to do that and we have a lot of of us have this thing where we don't want to give up on students or their families. What makes our school so special is how connected we are and when there is a

What are the pros and cons of this job? I would say pros is that while I'm not in the classroom anymore, and I will always miss being a teacher, I love that as a building administrator I'm still around students in academia. 
