
WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

To ensure the delivery of quality instruction, all teachers at CHES are highly qualified. Our teacher: student ratio is also low, which provides time for individualized instruction. To promote and sustain academic success, our teachers constantly receive professional development training in order to adopt new and innovative instructional strategies to improve their performance. Programs and strategies such as: reading intervention, math intervention, progress monitoring benchmarks, and 120 minutes of daily uninterrupted reading instruction are used to support the learning process. Additionally, we embed character education lessons throughout school life to help students develop the social and life skills needed to foster the development of the whole child. 


The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing
