## Andrews High School Music Update

Congratulations to Matthew Howard (Tenor), a 10<sup>th</sup> grader at AHS, who qualified for All-State Choir. This was his first audition for All-State Choir, and it is the first time in the last 10 years that Andrews High School has sent students to All-State Choir!



The release of the 2014 State Report Card on Friday, November 14, has once again proven that Georgetown County School District is one of the highest achieving districts in the state.

GCSD is one of only seven of the state's 83 districts to earn an "Excellent" Absolute Rating and an "Excellent" Growth Rating, and GCSD is the only district in South Carolina to register an improved Growth Rating in each of the past three years.

Also, this is the third consecutive "Excellent" Absolute Rating for GCSD.

Superintendent Dr. Randy Dozier said the great report card is a reason for many people to celebrate.

"Achieving Excellent/Excellent is a tremendous accomplishment by Georgetown County School District which only happened because of the hard work by many groups," said Dozier. "Students, parents, teachers, support staff, administrators, our school board, PTA's, SIC's, booster clubs, businesses, and community groups all played a role in making this happen. This is the result that can happen when many people work together for a common goal."

Also receiving "Excellent" Absolute ratings were Carvers Bay High School, Georgetown High School, Waccamaw High School, Waccamaw Intermediate School, and Waccamaw Elementary School. Carvers Bay High, Georgetown High, Waccamaw High, Waccamaw Intermediate, and Waccamaw Elementary also received "Excellent" Growth ratings.

"Having experienced growth from 2006 through this year as we have migrated from Palmetto Achievement Challenge Test to Palmetto Assessment of State Standards, GCSD emerged as a district where hard work and professional development have worked hand-in-hand to achieve this goal," said Patti Hammel, Executive Director for Student Performance and Federal Programs.

Hammel credited Professional Learning Teams as playing a major role in the district's success.

"One of the greatest tools GCSD has utilized to bring our achievement to a high level has been the establishment of Professional Learning Teams," said Hammel. "Teams of teachers continue to work together to share knowledge and expertise in curriculum and strategies that they use to teach the content. They also peruse assessments together to see how effective the strategies have been in meeting students' needs.

"The power of more than one professional working together is profound. Our students have been presented the most engaging strategies, and our student achievement has grown markedly. We are so very proud of our administrators, teachers, students, and parents for doing such wonderful work."

Dozier emphasized the Excellent/Excellent report card grades could not have been earned without a group effort.

"This achievement speaks as to how Georgetown County values the importance of a good education," said Dozier. "This excellent report card was achieved by the hard work and extra efforts of a larger team of a variety of people. This grade reflects how the district did as a whole, not just one school or area.

"I want to thank everyone personally who contributed to this success and we look forward to future successes and continued improvements."

# ANDREWS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT ID POLICY

1<sup>st</sup> offense - Students will be charged for a temporary ID. Teachers should have students sign a referral for a warning (code 360); submit to administrator to place in PowerSchool discipline.

2<sup>nd</sup> offense - Students will be charged for a temporary ID. Teachers should have students sign a referral for a warning (code 360); submit to administrator to place in PowerSchool discipline.

3<sup>rd</sup> offense - Students will be charged for a temporary ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an overnight suspension and parent notification of the accrued charges for temporary IDs.

4<sup>th</sup> offense - Students will be charged for a new ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an afterschool detention and parent notification of the accrued charges for IDs.

5<sup>th</sup> offense - Students will be charged for a new ID or for a temporary ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an in-school suspension and parent notification of the accrued charges for IDs.

6<sup>th</sup> offense - Students will be charged for a new ID or for a temporary ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an out-of-school suspension and parent notification of the accrued charges for IDs.

(Students may report to the front office to receive a temporary ID for \$1.00 until 7:45 each day).

(Maximum charge for ID will be \$15.00 at any given time; administrators will collect fees from parents once charges reach \$15.00).

# ANDREWS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT TARDY POLICY

#### Purpose

The purpose of a tardy policy is to allow class instruction to begin promptly with as few distractions as possible. Students who are tardy will face disciplinary actions. (We also feel it is important to better prepare students for the work environment where attendance and promptness is valued.)

#### **Basic Rules**

Teachers should make their class procedures very clear. Identify at what point you will mark students not tardy (in the door, in their desk, etc.)

#### **Procedures / Consequences**

All periods / blocks (Students late to 1st block after 8:00 am should have a pass from Mrs. Cumbie)

1<sup>st</sup>offense -Teachers should have student sign a referral for a warning (code 180).

2<sup>nd</sup> offense - Teachers should have student sign a referral for a warning (code 180).

3<sup>rd</sup> offense - Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 180) for student to be issued an overnight suspension.

4<sup>th</sup> offense - Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 180) for student to be issued an afterschool detention and parent notification.

5<sup>th</sup> offense - Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 180) for student to be issued an in-school suspension and parent notification.

An effort-based school improvement initiative founded on the conviction that most students can master rigorous academic and career/technical studies if school leaders and teachers create an environment that motivates students to make the effort to succeed.

# The Individual Graduation Plan (IGP)

Studies of how young people make educational and career decisions reveal that parents are the #1 influence on their child's career planning. By the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, all students in South Carolina with the help of their parents and school counselors will be thinking about careers and writing high school academic plans in an Individual Graduation Plan (IGP). The IGP is designed to guide students through career exploration, postsecondary preparation, and workforce transition.

Finding a successful and satisfying career without proper planning can be difficult. South Carolina students begin the Individual Graduation Plan process to answer the question "What do you want to be when you grow up?" by choosing a field of study or profession they are interested in, then developing a plan to guide their high school coursework. The Individual Graduation Plan will be each student's roadmap for achieving his or her career goals—be it technical skill training, college, the military or joining the workforce.

An IGP includes general graduation requirements, out-of-classroom learning opportunities and electives based on each student's chosen field of interest, or cluster of study. South Carolina offers 16 clusters of study based on a national model. Each career cluster is a grouping of related real-world professions. For example, a student interested in being a police officer would select the "Law, Public Safety, Corrections and Security" cluster.

Prior to choosing a career cluster, students will complete career exploration and assessment activities to help them pick their areas of interest. Once they choose a career cluster, students will develop their IGPs with the help of school counselors and parents or parental designees. Students, counselors and parents will monitor what the student has done and still needs to do to meet his or her IGP and will meet annually to discuss and adjust the IGP or change clusters.

IGPs are one of several new Personal Pathways to Success components designed to connect academic studies with preparation for entering the workforce. While 85% of jobs today require some post-high school education, not all require a four-year degree. Parents and students can use informative resources to explore all options and make an informed decision, including college financial assistance options.

Created by the Education and Economic Development Act (EEDA) in 2005, Personal Pathways to Success enables students to explore and prepare for career opportunities through a more relevant curriculum and first-hand experience - connecting academic studies with preparation for entering the workforce through planning and exploring various career options. All levels of S.C. public education participate in the Personal Pathways to Success initiative.
