

ANDREWS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT ID POLICY



1st offense - Students will be charged for a temporary ID. Teachers should have students sign a referral; submit to administrator to place in PowerSchool discipline as a warning (code 360).

2nd offense - Students will be charged for a temporary ID. Teachers should have students sign a referral; submit to administrator to place in PowerSchool discipline as a warning (code 360).

3rd offense - Students will be charged for a temporary ID. Teachers should have students sign a referral (code 360); submit to administrator to place in PowerSchool discipline as an overnight suspension.

4th offense - Students will be charged for a new ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an after-school detention and parent notification of the accrued charges for IDs.

 $5^{th} - 7^{th}$ offenses - Students will be charged for a new ID or for a temporary ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an in-school suspension and parent notification of the accrued charges for IDs.

8th and additional offenses - Students will be charged for a new ID or for a temporary ID. Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 360) for student to be issued an out-of-school suspension and parent notification of the accrued charges for IDs.

(Maximum charge for ID will be \$15.00 at any given time; administrators will collect fees from parents once charges reach \$15.00).

ANDREWS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT TARDY POLICY



Purpose

The purpose of a tardy policy is to allow class instruction to begin promptly with as few distractions as possible. Students who are tardy will face disciplinary actions. (We also feel it is important to better prepare students for the work environment where attendance and promptness is valued.)

Basic Rules

Teachers should make their class procedures very clear. Identify at what point you will mark students not tardy (in the door, in their desk, etc.)

Procedures / Consequences

All periods /blocks (Students late to 1st block after 8:00 am should have a pass from Mrs. Cumbie)

- 1st offense -Teachers should have student sign a referral for a warning (code 180).
- 2nd offense Teachers should have student sign a referral for a warning (code 180).
- 3rd offense Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 180) for student to be issued an overnight suspension.
- 4th offense Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 180) for student to be issued an after-school detention and parent notification.
- $5^{th} 7^{th}$ offenses Complete the referral and turn in to the appropriate administrator (code 180) for student to be issued an in-school suspension and parent notification.

High Schools That Work

An effort-based school improvement initiative founded on the conviction that most students can master rigorous academic and career/technical studies if school leaders and teachers create an environment that motivates students to make the effort to succeed.

GOALS:

- ~Getting 85 percent of students to meet reading, mathematics and science goals.
- ~Teaching students the essential content of the college-preparatory academic core and a career or academic concentration.



Professional Teaching and Learning Cycle

A six step process designed to deepen the professional collaboration among staff as they engage in ongoing, job-embedded professional learning teams. Also, to develop initial skills in designing structures and procedures for ongoing, job-embedded, and data-driven professional learning teams that focus on the alignment of curriculum, instruction, and assessment.

GOAL:

~Learn the best approach for working systemically to improve student achievement in reading and mathematics in high challenge schools.



The Individual Graduation Plan (IGP)

Studies of how young people make educational and career decisions reveal that parents are the #1 influence on their child's career planning. By the 8th grade, all students in South Carolina with the help of their parents and school counselors will be thinking about careers and writing high school academic plans in an Individual Graduation Plan (IGP). The IGP is designed to guide students through career exploration, postsecondary preparation, and workforce transition.

Finding a successful and satisfying career without proper planning can be difficult. South Carolina students begin the Individual Graduation Plan process to answer the question "What do you want to be when you grow up?" by choosing a field of study or profession they are interested in, then developing a plan to guide their high school coursework. The Individual Graduation Plan will be each student's roadmap for achieving his or her career goals—be it technical skill training, college, the military or joining the workforce.

An IGP includes general graduation requirements, out-of-classroom learning opportunities and electives based on each student's chosen field of interest, or cluster of study. South Carolina offers 16 clusters of study based on a national model. Each career cluster is a grouping of related real-world professions. For example, a student interested in being a police officer would select the "Law, Public Safety, Corrections and Security" cluster.

Prior to choosing a career cluster, students will complete career exploration and assessment activities to help them pick their areas of interest. Once they choose a career cluster, students will develop their IGPs with the help of school counselors and parents or parental designees. Students, counselors and parents will monitor what the student has done and still needs to do to meet his or her IGP and will meet annually to discuss and adjust the IGP or change clusters.

IGPs are one of several new Personal Pathways to Success components designed to connect academic studies with preparation for entering the workforce. While 85% of jobs today require some post-high school education, not all require a four-year degree. Parents and students can use informative resources to explore all options and make an informed decision, including college financial assistance options.

Created by the Education and Economic Development Act (EEDA) in 2005, Personal Pathways to Success enables students to explore and prepare for career opportunities through a more relevant curriculum and first-hand experience - connecting academic studies with preparation for entering the workforce through planning and exploring various career options. All levels of S.C. public education participate in the Personal Pathways to Success initiative.


