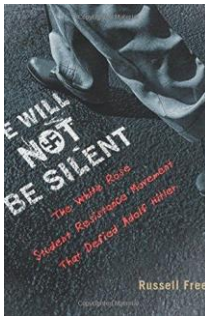
**Some Kind of Courage by Dan Gemeinhart**

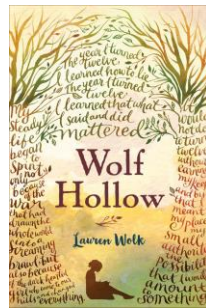
**We Will Not be Silent by Russell Freedman**

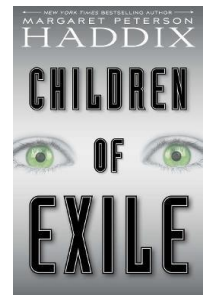


**Booked by Kwame Alexander**

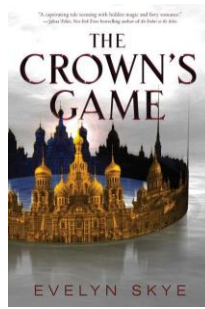
**Children of EXILE by Margaret Peterson Haddix**

A twelve-year-old girl raised in a foster village is returned to her biological parents, and discovers home is not what she expected it to be.



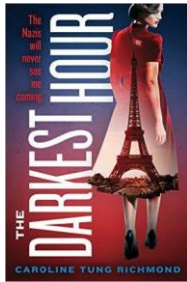
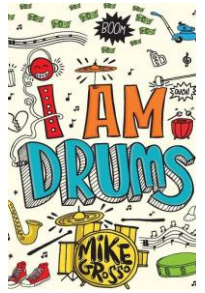
***The Crown's Game* by Evelyn Skye**

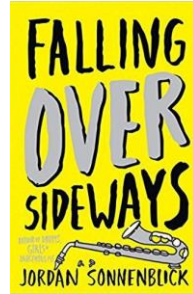


***The Inquisitor's Tale* by Adam Gidwitz**

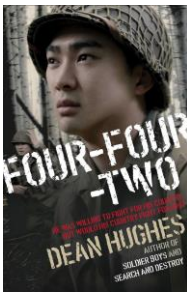
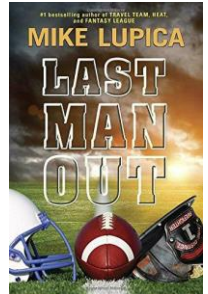
***Falling Over Sideways* by Jordan Sonnenblick**

After her mother dies, Lina travels to Italy where she discovers her mother's journal and sets off on an adventure to unearth her mother's secrets.

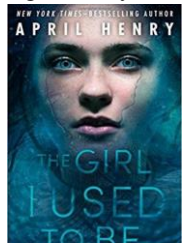
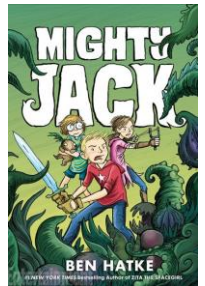
***Ghost* by Jason Reynolds**
