Children/Education **Problems** Worked long hours (10-12 straight) Mother's brought nursing infants to work Loud noises Older children brought meals to work Children dropped out of school @ 4 years Choking dust and lint Overwhelming heat and humidity Poor wages Child labor Dropping out of school to work risk of being injured or killed no insurance or workman's compensation had to live in mill village/ small ancestry home **Jim Crow Perks** African Americans would work for up to 6 Close to job, small close knit community, recreational activities, clubs, pranks weeks without pay African American males would perform the heaviest jobs African American females were excluded from mill work African American boys were doffers or
