 level to read this summer. You can purchase the book at a store or you can go to the
 public library and check-out the book to read.
- 2. Then, students will need to write a paragraph that summarizes the book. The work may be typed or handwritten on loose leaf notebook paper.
- 3. All work should show correct grammar, punctuation, and mechanics.

Other Reminders

It is very important that students come to school already knowing their basic addition and subtraction facts. By the time school starts, students should be able to add and subtract without using their fingers.
