

An intimate audience of students, faculty, & press gathered in the Waccamaw High School auditorium on the afternoon of September 25<sup>th</sup> to welcome South Carolina's Governor, Nikki Haley; she was in town campaigning for her re-election bid for the office of governor of this great state. This unprecedented event was the culmination of months of planning, and hard work, carried out by the members of the Young Republicans Club. What at one point was only a dream, became a reality when Governor Haley stepped

on stage to welcome a boisterous round of applause from the audience. Governor Haley was joined on stage by Dr. Randy Dozier, the Superintendent of Georgetown County Schools, Dr. David Hammel, Principal of Waccamaw High School, and Rep. Stephen Goldfinch. The privilege of introducing Governor Haley fell to the presiding officers of the Young Republicans Club, Bobby Walters and Rachel Thornton. Mr. Walters spoke briefly about the formation and direction of the Young Republicans Club before passing the duties of speaker over to Ms. Thornton; who gave the audience a brief background into the life of Governor Haley. With introductions complete, Governor Haley, confidently stepped up to the podium and spoke on a



number of topics. Though she was in town for campaign purposes, Governor Haley did not venture much into the political realm of conversation. She instead chose to emphasize the importance of working hard to overcome adversity, as well as the importance of working together to get great things accomplished. A brief segment of her visit was dedicated to answering questions from the audience. Students, like Ben Hughes and

Peyton Johnson, asked relevant ques-

vant questions pertaining to Governor Haley's stance on foreign policy, to the overall experience of running for governor. Waccamaw High's staff even got into the mix. Ms. Kies inquired about Common Core and the state of education in South Carolina, and Mr. Phillips, sponsor of the Young Republicans club, was curious about personal training as a political


figure. Governor Haley wrapped things up by encouraging the students in attendance to not be afraid of following their hearts, and to demonstrate passion in their future endeavors. # Blood Donation Requirements FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS



Thank you for your interest in donating blood; by donating, you are giving life to someone in need. In order to provide the safest possible donation experience, we have changed the criteria for the whole blood donation. Selection criteria now includes a table based on height and weight to determine if students are eligible.

MALE donors must weigh 110 pounds or more, depending on their height in the following chart:

If you are	4'10"	4'11"	5' or taller
You must weigh at least	118	114	110


**FEMALE** donors must weigh 110 pounds or more, depending on their height in the following chart:

If you are	5'1"	5'2"	5'3"	5'4"	5'5"	5'6" or taller
You must weigh at least	133	129	124	120	115	110

\*Females who are shorter than 5'1" may still be eligible to donate blood. They may call 866-236-3276 to ask about their eligibility.

Even if you have donated successfully in the past, you will not be allowed to donate if you do not meet this new criteria. We understand this may disappoint those of you who have donated in the past. We encourage you to donate again when you meet this criteria.

By the fall of 2013, with the support of the Georgetown County School Board, numerous community volunteers and a major start up contribution from Matthew Brittain, WHS Sailing was under way.

We now have access through Winyah Bay Sailing Club (our parent organization) to six, completely rigged Vanguard 420s on floating docks at Hazzard Marine in Georgetown. 

One of the following radon topics must be depicted in the artwork:


- 1. What is radon?





On Tuesday, September 30<sup>th</sup>, Waccamaw held their first on-campus ACT. The ACT is an achievement test that measures how much a student has learned in school; it has five components: English, Mathematics, Reading, Science, and Writing. Students had to sign up and pay \$53.50 at registration to take the test; it lasted from 8:00am to 12:45pm with 126 students attending. When asked about the test, Mrs. McCants, Assistant Principal/Curriculum Specialist, said, "Overall, the test went pretty smoothly, especially since this was the first time we have given the ACT here."


