Two WHS Students Receive Notification for an Interview in the Teaching Fellows Program

Two seniors in Mrs. Humowitz's Teacher Cadet class have been offered interviews for the South Carolina Teaching Fellows Program. Every year, the program provides Fellowships for up to 175 high school seniors who desire to teach in South Carolina, exhibit high academic achievement, and have contributed to their school and community. The South Carolina universities involved in the program are: Anderson University, Charleston Southern University, College of Charleston, Columbia College, Francis Marion University, Lander University, Newberry College, USC Columbia, USC Upstate, and Winthrop University. Students who are selected into the Teaching Fellows Program receive up to \$6,000 a year for four years and agree to teach in South Carolina for the amount of years that they received funding from the Fellowship.

Art Institute Visits FACS Classes

On January 14th, Jessica Levkoff from the Art Institute Culinary School visited Ms. Hossa's Family and Consumer Science classes. Levkoff is a culinary specialist and is now opening her own bakery called Charleston Cheesecakes. In Ms. Hossa's class, she talked about the art institute and discussed the programs that are offered there, focusing on food and fashion related majors. Later, in a cooking demonstration, she used molecular gastronomy to make fruit caviar, her own spin on peach cobbler. She also taught the students how to make homemade whipping cream. The caviar and whipping cream were then served on vanilla wafers to the students.

Materials Needed:

11 oz. of Kerns Peach Nectar

2, 4" fine mesh stainless steel strainers

Note: You can use lots of different liquids in this

experiment, such as soda, coconut milk, tomato

juice, grape fruit juice or any fruit nectars. The amount of solids and acidity in the liquid you

choose is critical to success. Experiment with

the amount of sodium alginate and types of

liquids used until good caviar is made

3 grams calcium chloride

3. 16.9 oz. bottled water

3 grams sodium alginate

2, 2-qt mixing bowls

1 immersion blender

2, 4-qt. mixing bowl

3 squirt bottles

Plastic spoons

Digital gram scale



FRUIT CAVIAR

Procedure:

- 1. Add desired flavoring liquid to a 4-qt. mixing bowl.
- 2. Add water from one 16.9 oz. bottle to a 2-qt. mixing bowl.
- 3. Add water from two 16.9 oz. bottles to a 4-qt. mixing bowl.
- 4. Add the 3 grams sodium alginate to the 11oz of Nectar.
- 5. Mix with a blender until a <u>smooth</u> gel is achieved. Chunks of sodium alginate will clog the squeeze bottles.
- Add the 3grmas of Calcium Chloride; dissolve in 2qt bowl containing 16.9 oz. of water.
- 7. Strain the gel into 3 plastic squirt bottles, dividing evenly.
- Drip the gel into the Calcium Chloride solution. You will see caviar begin to form.
- Leave the caviar in the solution for approx. 1 minute to allow the outer surface to form a skin. The center should remain liquid and burst with flavor when you bite into it! Leaving it in the solution too long will result in caviar that is solid all the way through.
- Remove caviar using a strainer from the calcium chloride solution when ready and rinse with fresh water. Strain well.
- 11. Serve!



End Distracted Driving

What is Distracted Driving?

~Driving while engaged in any activity that could divert a person's attention away from the primary task of driving.

On Friday, January 24th, Waccamaw High students attended an assembly provided by WAVE to promote safe driving habits. The "End Distracted Driving" presentation was given by guest speaker George Jebailey from Florence, SC. The Casey Feldman Foundation was founded by a couple who lost their daughter, Casey, to a distracted driver when she was just 21 years old. After meeting Casey's family, Mr. Jebailey began spreading awareness of distracted driving. The slideshow presented by Mr. Jebailey was created by Casey's father and it explained the three types of distracted driving: manual, visual, and cognitive. Manual distraction is when the driver is physically doing something distracting such as texting or even just changing the radio

station. Visual distraction is when the driver is not paying attention to the road and is looking at something else. Cognitive distraction is when the driver's mind isn't completely focused on driving. Various examples of these distractions were presented using videos incorporated within the slideshow along with videos that showed the consequences of distracted driving. Students learned that about ten people die every day from distracted driving, 25% of teens are more likely to drive distracted, and that adults are guilty of distracted driving too! Mr. Jebaily concluded the presentation by encouraging everyone to sign and take home a pledge to family and friends to help end distracted driving. Every accident involving a distracted driver is 100% preventable; Don't make the selfish choice of driving distracted.

On Thursday, January 16th, both the girls and boys teams traveled to Loris to participate in their first region game. It was an even-matched game for the Lady Warriors until the 3rd quarter when they started pulling away. They outscored the Lions by 4 in the 3rd, and 7 in the 4th to take the win 37-28. Leading the team were junior Alexis Grove with 12 points and 8 steals and freshman D'Avion Funnye with 9 points, 10 rebounds, 3 assists, and 3 steals. On the boys' team, the Loris Lions came out strong leading 30-18 at the end of the 1st quarter. The Warriors were able to slow down the Lions the rest of the game but ran out of time leaving the Warriors trailing by 3. The final score was 69-72. Leading scorers included: Rob Ferraro with 14 points, and Jack Dwyer and Justin Busby both with 13.

Waccamaw vs Aynor

The Warriors second region game took place at Aynor High School on Tuesday the 21st. The Lady Warriors played a tough game but lost by 8 points with a score of 35-43. Kadijah Smalls scored the most individual points with 15, followed by D'Avion Funnye with 7 points. The boys' team took home their first region win of the season defeating Aynor 57-52. Jemon Smalls led the team with 15 points followed by Justin Busby with 12, Jack Dwyer with 11 points and 7 for 7 on free throws, and Rob Ferraro with 10 points.

Waccamaw vs Marion

On Friday, Jan. 24th, Waccamaw hosted the Marion Swamp Foxes. The Lady Warriors took a loss with a score of 46-31. Marion took the lead in the 1st quarter and never gave it up. Leading the Lady Warriors were Brianna Brooks with 9 points, Alexis Grove with 6 points, and Jada Torrance with a career high of 17 rebounds. The team record is now 3-9 (1-2 in region play). The boys' team also took a loss with a score of 67-59. Leading by 5 at the half, Waccamaw and Marion battled for points. The game was tied in the 3rd quarter, but Marion took to the court in the 4th quarter and dominated the rest of the game adding 24 points against Waccamaw's 16. Leading the Warriors were Rob Ferraro with 18 points, and Justin Busby and Jack Dwyer, each with 10 points. The team record is now 7-7.


