
# MAKING A CLEAN SWEEP

### **Region Games Come to a Close**

Last Friday, the Warriors hit the road, travelling to Aynor to secure another round of region wins. The girls played a primarily defensive game against the Blue Jackets, limiting scoring to single digits in a few quarters. The Lady Warriors eventually prevailed 31-26, improving to 5-3 in the region. The boy's game was just as close, but provided a much higher rate of scoring. Both teams vied for the lead throughout the game, making it hard to predict who would come out on top. The Warriors were up 20-13 at the half, but Aynor fought hard to take the lead in the third. With a final inspired push, Waccamaw was able to secure the victory 51-46 at the final buzzer. Justin Hardee stood out in the last few minutes, scoring 6 of the 10 points that allowed the boys to take home the win. The boys improved to 6-2 in the region, standing alone in second place.

Monday night was Senior Night for the Warriors, as they faced off against Marion. The girls played a great game against the Swamp Foxes, winning 46-34. With this victory, they finished third in the region, the best finish by the Lady Warriors in school history. In between games, seniors from both teams as well as the cheerleading squad were recognized for their contributions to their respective programs. From the girls' varsity: Joneisha Coachman, Sydney Derrick, Shavashia Grant, Alexis Grove, and Madeline Hoffman were recognized. Seniors: Karim Stanley, Jack Dwyer, Jemon Smalls, Doug Roe, Rob Ferraro, Justin Hardee, and Dustin Crider were thanked for their commitment to the boys' varsity. Senior varsity cheerleaders: Kay Kay Getz, Caroline Lalla, Meaisha Myers, Jane-Madison Sellers, Ronnesha Thompson, and Alli Ward were also recognized for their years leading the cheer squad. The varsity boys then took to the court to play a controlled game against the Swamp Foxes. By the half, Waccamaw was up 37-24 to Marion. The rest of the game was textbook as the Warriors held the lead until the final buzzer, winning 71-65.

On Wednesday, Dillon marked the last region game for the girls. After a remarkable season, they fell short to the Wildcats, finishing the season 6-4 in third place. The boys suffered the same loss to the boys of Dillon, missing the chance to close out the region in second place. They now must face off against Dillon again tonight at Loris to break the 7-3 tie and decide who will take second place in the region. Best of luck, Warriors!




### What should YOU Bring to the event?

Checklist of items NEEDED from you and your parent(s)/guardian(s) in order to successfully complete and submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) during a College Goal South Carolina event\*:

- Social Security Number
- Alien Registration Number (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- Most recent federal income tax returns, W-2s, and other records of money earned\*\*
- Bank statements and records of investments (if applicable)
- Records of untaxed income (if applicable)
- Federal Student Aid PIN to sign electronically (if you do not already have one, visit www.pin.ed.gov)

\*If you are not a dependent student, you do not need the listed items from your parent(s)/guardian(s).

\*\*You may be able to transfer your federal tax return information into your FAFSA using the IRS Data Retrieval Tool.


