YOUNG EAGLES 8/23/14

WASA Club, Waccamaw Association of Space and Aviation, was invited by Amanda Stirgwolt, of Georgetown County Public Works, to participate in Young Eagles held at the Georgetown County Airport for National Aviation Week from August 18th to August 24th. Ian Kelley, a sophomore and WASA member, flew with retired test pilot Dan Drost on Saturday, August 23rd. He was the first Young Eagle at the airport to arrive and also made the first flight of the day. Young Eagles is a program sponsored by the Experimental Aircraft Association, EAA; with the number of pilots decreasing, the EAA started Young Eagles to inspire young people to learn to fly

and get their pilot's license. So far, there have been over 1.6 million Young Eagles.

Dan Drost flew his 1952 de Havilland Chipmunk which is listed as an experimental aircraft for Young Eagles flights. Barry Brock, Charles Craddock, and Gary Burleson also flew Young Eagles from schools around Georgetown County, mostly from elementary schools. Barry flew his Maule that is much like a bush plane, Charles flew a Cessna 182, and Gary flew a Beach Bonanza. The Young Eagles had a great time on the beautiful Saturday morning.

One does not have to wait on WASA, or any of the schools, to go to the airport to fly in the Young Eagles Program. Parents can drive their child(ren) to the Georgetown County Airport and have a pilot sign them up to fly. Each participant gets two certificates: one to take home and one that stays online with Oshkosh for parents, partici-



pants, and employers to see what each person did that day, who each person flew with, and the name of the aircraft flown. Participants must be at least eight years old, but not older than seventeen. Students are allowed to fly as long as they meet the age requirements, flying at least once at each Young Eagles event with no payment required.

If you're interested in flying, this is the best deal around because you're flying at no cost. This is truly an introduction to flight for a young person. If you're not planning to be a pilot and just want the experience of flight, Young Eagles is there for you too.

A brief rain shower caused the ball to become slippery, leading to a bad snap for Waccamaw, which resulted in a safety, giving the Bears their first 2 points of the game. After a few turnovers from both sides, Carvers Bay scored on a touchdown pass,

leaving the score at 14-8. Tyriq Grant scooped up a high snap intended for the Bear's quarterback giving Waccamaw the ball near the end zone. Shortly after, Kelton Grant ran the ball in for his second touchdown of the night, leading to the final score of 21-8. Waccamaw's defense played a great team effort; they caused multiple turnovers and several sacks. The key to Waccamaw's victory was great defense and timely offense. The Warriors are now 2-1 and look to get another win tonight against Georgetown at Georgetown High.

Waccamaw Boys Win Socastee Invitational

Waccamaw boys swam to victory in a 13 team meet hosted by Socastee High School at Coastal Carolina University this past Saturday. 234 swimmers participated. The Warriors had 118 points, followed by the Socastee with 84, and West Florence with 75. Waccamaw girls took 8th place with 21 points.

Waccamaw boys sealed the win with a first place finish in the final event, the 400 free relay. The boys' team of Luke LaRochelle, Jonah Crosby, Michael Dear, and Patrick Sullivan held off a strong Socastee relay for the win in 3:28.40, a time that puts them 3rd in the current state rankings. "It came down to a very fast 48 split by Patrick Sullivan on the anchor leg," says Coach Dear. "All the guys put him in a position to bring it home and he did it with an explanation point. Both the boys and girls swam really well. We mixed up events and relays and everyone


